

Championship Plowing Meet Opens Today In Peebles, Ohio

The world championship plowing competition gets underway today at Peebles, Ohio with Stanley Willis of Cornwall in this province and Hugh Baird of Blackwater, Ontario representing Canada.

Plowmen from fourteen countries are competing for the world title. They are Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Great Zealand Norway Sweden, West Germany the United States and Canada.

The world champion will be announced Friday (tomorrow) night at the Master Plowmen's banquet in the Peebles High School gymnasium.

The plowing competitions are being held in with a farm show on a grandiose scale. Actually the show got underway on Tuesday and runs through tomorrow. It is officially known as the "1957 World's Conservation Exposition and Plowing Contest."

Sixteen farms have been loaned for the occasion with a total of 2,500 acres.

Visitors to the event will see not only the best in conservation practices and plowing competitions, but also will see demonstrated and on display more than a million dollars worth of farm and industrial equipment.

Among the demonstrations: A remote controlled tractor plowing and disking with no visible operator; model of a nuclear power plant; rubber fuel storage tanks; giant model of a cow, 25 times larger than life-size, which bellows, breathes and has a heart beat; new hog self-feeders and farrowing houses; four full size farm buildings consisting of grain bin, special building, two 16-foot bays of a utility building, and frameless gable roof building, plus scale model of a dairy milking parlor, a farm store and rigid frame building; live registered American Brahman cattle; a full-size deluxe farm, and cutaway model of a farm silo.
