Delegates Named At KC Convention

SOURIS—Newly elected state deputy George Clow of Summerside and past state deputy John Doyle of Charlottetown were elected to attend the supreme convention at the 39th annual convention of the Knights of Columbus held here Wednesday.

The supreme convention is scheduled for St. Louis, Mo., in August.

Other officers elected to the state council were: Merle Muller, Summerside, state advocate; B.M. Callaghan, Charlottetown, state warden; George Cheverie, Charlottetown, state treasurer; John J. Butler, Charlottetown, camp treasurer.

The convention was attended by Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown and Msgr. J.A. Murphy of Souris, diocesan Vice-General. Also in attendance were delegates from the Island's three councils and various divisions.

It was decided that plans for the operation of the K of C. Memorial Camp at Rustico would be completed at a special meeting of the state scheduled May 23 at Charlottetown.

The next state convention will be held in Charlottetown in May of 1960.

Local Group Seeks To Buy Raceway

SUMMERSIDE—Prospects for increased racing at Summerside loomed yesterday when it was learned that a group of local business men were dickering for the purchase of Summerside Raceway.

The Raceway, one of the finest plants in the Maritimes when it was opened six years ago, is owned by the estate of J.K. Curran.

The purchase price offered by the group was believed to be \$15,000 and another \$5,000 will have to be spent to repair the park that has been badly damaged by vandals.

When built in 1953 the plant cost \$100,000. It was officially opened by the then Prime Minister of Canada Louis St. Laurent.

Thus far races have been scheduled here on Dominion Day and Lobster Carnival week. It is likely an expanded program will ensue following the purchase.

The purchase of a novel adult tricycle has given a Summerside lady, Miss Mary Geldart a new lease on life.

The victim of the crippling disease Multiple Sclerosis Miss Geldart is now enjoying the freedom of the outdoors and is able to approach her handicap with the confidence of a new self reliance.

Miss Geldart a gifted musician, was forced to retire as organist of Trinity United Church last year after the disease had developed over a period of 12 years and was faced with an uncertain future when she had a chance meeting with Wilfred F. Wright of Florida, another victim of the disease.

Mr. Wright had used a similar vehicle for a number of years and had many long trips on it. Miss Geldart bought her tricycle from the U.S. for \$200 including duty and taxes and now that spring has arrived she is now able to enjoy much more freedom in an activity that at the same time strengthens her diseased muscles.

ALBERTON — The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met in the Church at Alberton on Tuesday, May 20th, for the induction of the Rev. J.Y. Garrett, of Tara, Ontario, who has been serving as stated supply at Alberton for the past six months.

The Moderator, the Rev. D.A. Campbell, presided and concluded the worship, assisted by the Clerk, the Rev. T.H.B. Somers, who read the lessons and offered the prayers. Mr. Campbell preached an eloquent sermon appropriate to the nature of the service and called upon pastor and people to renew their vows of dedication to the service of God and the work of His Church.

The Clerk, Mr. Somers, related the steps leading to the calling of Mr. Garrett, and the Moderator then put the prescribed questions to minister and congregation. Having received satisfactory answers, the Presbytery solemnly inducted Rev. J.Y. Garrett into the pastoral charge of Alberton and West Point.

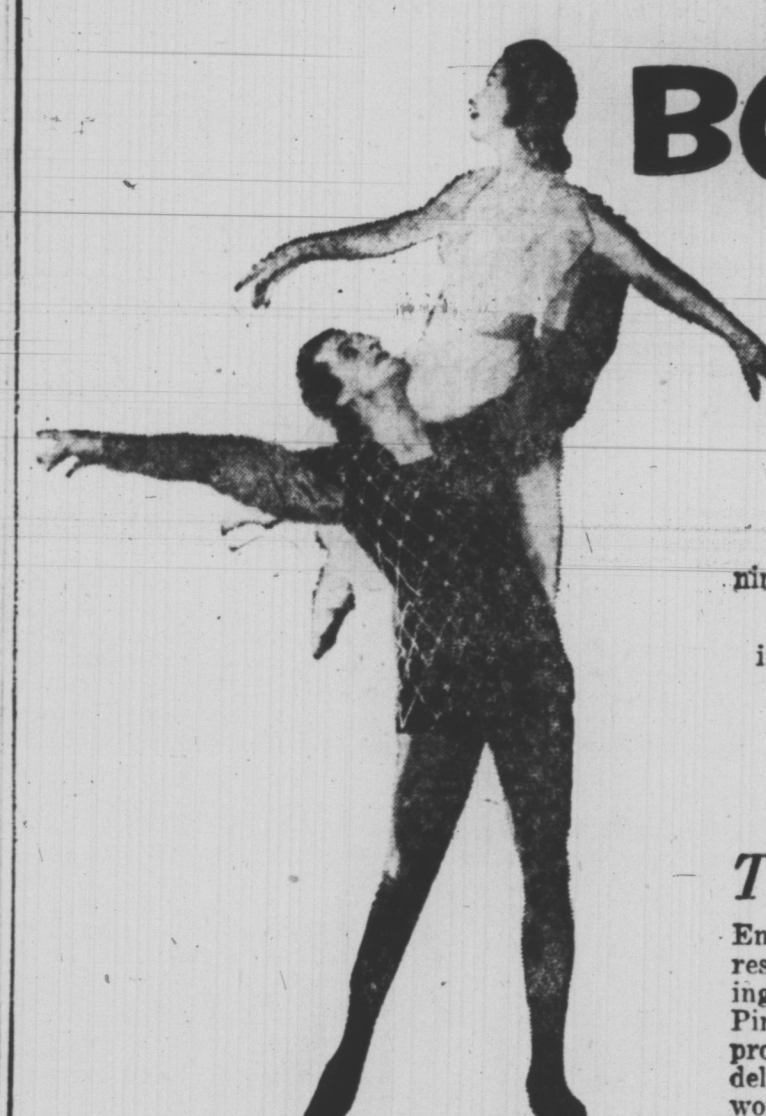
