Provincial Treasurer Makes Appointments

Provincial Treasurer Alban Farmer has announced a re-organization of executive positions in the treasury department.

W.E. Massey, F.C.A., R.I.A., deputy treasurer for 18 years, has been appointed director of federal-provincial fiscal relations.

Mr. Massey has succeeded as deputy treasurer by G. Douglas Dennis, C.A., who has been assistant deputy treasurer since 1962.

Mr. Farmer said that Mr. Massey was asked to be relieved of his duties as deputy treasurer on account of recent illness.

"The new duties to be assumed by Mr. Massey," said Mr. Farmer, "are extremely important at this time. Currently a study is being made which embodies the whole field of tax studies — federal, provincial and municipal — and the results of these studies will be the basis of the fiscal agreements between the provinces and the federal government for the five-year period beginning April 1, 1967."

"Mr. Massey will undertake this work for the province and it will be a lengthy and extensive study of tax potential and ability to pay and will extend over a period of approximately two years."

APPROCIATION

Mr. Farmer said "on behalf of the government and myself I offer sincere appreciation to Mr. Massey for his long period of excellent service and loyalty to this province and congratulations to Mr. Dennis on his appointment as deputy provincial treasurer."

Mr. Massey, who has been in government service for the past 33 years, was also provincial auditor for 14 years.

Social Credit MPs and 12 Creditists.

The Creditiste amendment came to a vote at the evening sitting and was snowed under from 194 to 22. Twelve Creditistes were supported by one Social Creditist, two New Democrats and seven Conservatives. The amendment was rejected by 113 Liberals, 60 Conservatives, 15 New Democrats and eight Social Creditists.

SECOND STRAIGHT LOSS

It was the second time this week the Ensign has lost in a Commons vote. Monday the House adopted a red-and-white maple leaf design after rejecting the Red Ensign as Canada's national flag.

Mr. Beaulieu said he saw no need for a second flag. Canada had had no flag for 97 years and now the government wanted to give the country two.

The Union Jack was the British flag and Canada had no right to take it as its own, he said.

Meanwhile the Senate continued its own debate on enforcement of the maple leaf design as the national flag and on a Conservative amendment to suspend further parliamentary action on this design.

Leading off the debate in the Red Chamber, Senator George White (PC-Ontario) criticized Senator Jean-Francois Pouliot saying Wednesday Royal Canadian Legion leaders are "mostly imperialists who don't represent the legion's rank and file members."

"It was entirely wrong for Senator Pouliot to make that statement," he said. The legion was not controlled by imperialists. Its leadership was made up of leading personalities in a business and professional world.

Judge Cracks Down On Probe Questions

OTTAWA (CP)—Chief Justice Frederic Duroin Thursday angrily cracked down on a question about Montreal Lawyer Pierre Lamontagne's mental condition.

"You have no right to ask that question," the chief justice told lawyer Guy Guerin, counsel for Raymond Denis, former executive assistant to Immigration Minister Tremblay.

It was the final question of Lamontagne who has been on the witness stand for three days, during a judicial inquiry into charges of bribery and corruption by ministerial assistants. The hearings resume here next Tuesday.

Mr. Guerin, concluding cross-examination of Mr. Lamontagne, asked whether the 29-year-old Montreal lawyer admitted he had been under a psychiatrist's care just before July 16, the date Lamontagne has testified Denis offered him \$30,000.

As the battery of lawyers probed at Lamontagne, a string of names of prominent lawyers was put on the record including those of Senator Louis P. Gellinas, Liberal party treasurer; Lionel Chevrier, former justice minister and now Canadian high commissioner in London; Industry Minister Drury, and Edmund Asselin, Liberal MP for

British Gov't Wins Back

LONDON (Reuters)—The Labor government won parliamentary backing for its nuclear defence policies by 311 votes to 291 Thursday night after a two-day foreign policy debate in the House of Commons.

The vote was only on a procedural motion to adjourn the House, which is normally not voted on.

again in London next May, said in a communique that, as long as the Communist aim of global conquest remains there will be tension. The change in Soviet leadership and China's nuclear bomb explosion increased future uncertainties. It was therefore felt essential that the alliance maintain and strengthen its unity.

The ministers agreed that further exchanges of views on various nuclear forces would be continued in NATO chambers, though both Brodie and a Canadian spokesman said this would not deter the big powers from continuing to negotiate outside NATO as well.

While attempting to overcome quarrels within the Western family of nations, the NATO ministers also emphasized the importance of avoiding dissemination of nuclear weapons and to pursue efforts to find peaceful solutions between East and West.

In the Commons, Creditiste leader Choquette said he had no objection to any province adopting the Red Ensign or Union Jack as a provincial flag but the federal Parliament should not give any formal recognition to a second flag.

Harold Winch (NDP—Vancouver East) said he couldn't understand how the flag committee could recommend the Union Jack. It was a flag "wholly and solely a national flag," he said.

Antoine Belanger (Creditiste—Charlevoix) said that having proved the maple leaf and red bars as a national flag, he was opposed to the approval of a second flag for Canada.

Not Summerside Printer F. W. Williams Dies At 87

SUMMERSIDE — A well-known life-long resident of Summerside, Frederick Wallace Williams, died at his home here Wednesday.

Mr. Williams, who was in his 88th year, was in the printing trade here for 37 years and from 1900 until 1952 was in partnership with Lucius B. Crue in the firm of Williams and Crue.

With the death of Mr. Crue at that time, Mr. Williams sold the business to the Journal-Pioneer and another for other parts of Canada—a two-flag principle, saying one thing to French Canada and another to English Canada.
