NEWFOUNDLAND

Lecture in St. Peter's Schoolroom Last Evening.

Rev. J. M. Withycombe delivered two lectures in Charlottetown—one on Monday evening and one on last evening. On both occasions he was greeted with good audiences and listened to with the closest attention. Last evening, in St. Peter's Schoolroom, he lectured, for the benefit of Prince Street School library, on Newfoundland. He treated almost entirely of Newfoundland's fishing industry and its fishermen. The lecturer, however, first gave a short geographical sketch of the Island, told of its discovery by John and Sebastian Cabot, and of its early settlers including Sir Walter Raleigh, Sir Humphrey Gilbert, Sir David Kirk, Lord Baltimore, and others. He then described the various fishing industries, the principal of which are "fish", (codfish) and seal, and gave sad accounts of the awful catastrophes which frequently take place on the Banks and off the coast of Labrador. Lastly he dealt with the French shore difficulties—"the greatest menace to the success of the colony." He quoted from the treaty of Utrecht and showed that the French have no real rights on the land whatever. They merely have concurrent fishing rights in the waters on one side of the Island. But the French with great audacity have trespassed greatly upon the rights of Newfoundland, while England, because of her friendship for France after the Crimean war, looked passively on.

A vote of thanks was eloquently moved by Rev. G. M. Campbell, heartily seconded by Mr. Fred'k Brecken and tendered to the lecturer by the chairman, Mr. Percy Pope.

After the lecture was over, a number of views, in, round, and about Newfoundland were thrown on the canvass, but owing to a disaster—disasters generally occur in connection with Newfoundland, Mr. Withycombe says—to the lantern, they were only a partial success. Between the lecture and the showing of the views Mr. J. R. Davison sang Kingsley's "Three Fishers."

Cotton, William Wyatt and J. D. Reid. There were impressive services at St. Paul's church and at the People's cemetery where the body of our well known and popular citizen was committed to the earth. A great many floral tributes were received from friends of the deceased, prominent among which were handsome offerings from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Howlan, the Sisters of the Convent de Notre Dame, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Davies and Mrs. A. McKinnon.

ZION'S NEW PASTOR.—Rev. D. B. McLeod, the new pastor of Zion Church, was formally inducted last evening in the presence of a large congregation. The services were very impressive. After the meeting of Presbytery in the vestry, the certifying by the clerk of the serving of the edict, and divine service by Rev. Mr. Miller the induction of the new pastor took place the steps leading up to the call being first recited. The induction over the right hand of fellowship was extended to Rev. Mr. McLeod by the Presbytery and the new pastor was addressed by Rev. T. F. Fullerton, after which he was introduced to the people. Rev. Mr. McLeod, was born at Orwell and received his collegiate education in the Western States. He labored in Quincy, Mass., and Virginia, returning to Orwell from the latter place after the death of his wife. Since his return he has had pastoral charge of the church at Orwell.
