Liberal Sees Threat To Fisheries In Maritimes

OTTAWA (CP) — Liberal A. Weale Stuart said Monday that Maritimes fisheries could be severely hurt by Conservative government plans to increase tariffs on agricultural imports from the United States. The MP for Charlotte, N.B., said the farm product tariffs would provide a weapon for U.S. interests trying to impose American tariffs against Canadian fish. "Tariff protection for Canadian agriculture, even in a small way, could adversely affect the fisheries of the Atlantic coast," he said during the Commons throne speech debate.

More than half of the east coast fish catch was sold in the U.S.—so far without tariff problems—and 90 per cent of the lobster catch was sold there.

CHARGES DISCRIMINATION
Mr. Stuart said the government's legislative plans will discriminate against fisheries and other primary producers in favor of agriculture. He could not support the proposed measure for cash advances on farm-stored prairie grain unless the government treated other primary producers in the same way.

"The very existence of other primary producers is being jeopardized to satisfy agriculture," Mr. Stuart, referring to announced Conservative plans for federal aid to power development in the Maritimes, said the offer is far less generous than that

Liberals Plan Atlantic Caucus

OTTAWA (CP)—Hon. John W. Pickersgill has been chosen chairman of a new parliamentary caucus of Liberal Atlantic province members.

Mr. Pickersgill, Commons member for Newfoundland's Bonaville-Twillingate and former immigration minister, was the only eastern seaboard cabinet member to survive the June 10 election defeat of the Liberals.

He will preside over a caucus of a dozen members, five each from New Brunswick and Newfoundland and two from Nova Scotia. Prince Edward Island returned no Liberals this time.

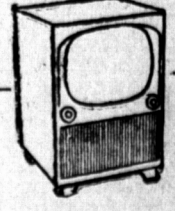
