(Federation of Agriculture News)

Eastern Conference

On Thursday the 22nd attendance at the Eastern Conference in Amherst included five delegates from Prince Edward Island. Possibly the most important matter discussed was the precarious position of the dairy industry faced with growing surpluses in some products, curtailed markets and the competition of surpluses manufactured from cheap imported oils. The tremendous surpluses built up in the United States in many farm products are a serious threat to world farm prices. The United States is presently following a policy of moving these surplus products at low prices and it is inevitable that such movement is bound to affect our position in Canada.

In dairy products the situation is held to be serious enough to justify holding, during the coming fall, a special International Conference at which agreement would be sought among the different nations on the question of stabilizing world prices and the movement between countries of the surpluses. The Ontario delegation brought forward the suggestion that efforts should be made to set up, during periods of high prices for hogs, a stabilization fund which could be used when the prices were low to assist in bringing returns up to a reasonable figure and in finding markets for excess production. The thought was freely expressed that farm producers must give serious consideration to devising plans for the handling of surpluses in order that more stability can be brought about and wide fluctuations in both prices and production warded off.

The new proposed hog grades again came up for attention with not too much evidence of agreement on the desirability of recommending the change until such time as definite information was available on the question of premiums and the differentials which

Haying Disaster

The week of July 18 was a disastrous one for the hay crop in this province, many farmers had haying operations in full swing and the result was that the continuing bad weather seriously damaged the crop regardless of the condition it was in. Even the standing hay has had its feed value impaired by the additional maturity and as frequently happens a bumper crop of high quality ends up as low quality feed. The wet weather has, of course, given pastures a new lease on life and milk production which was at record levels for the month of June will continue at well above normal.

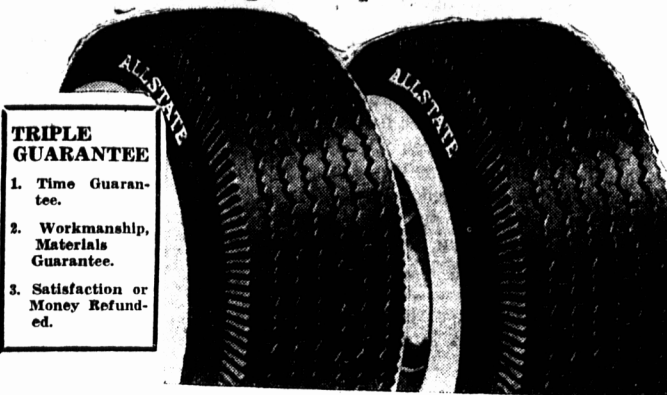

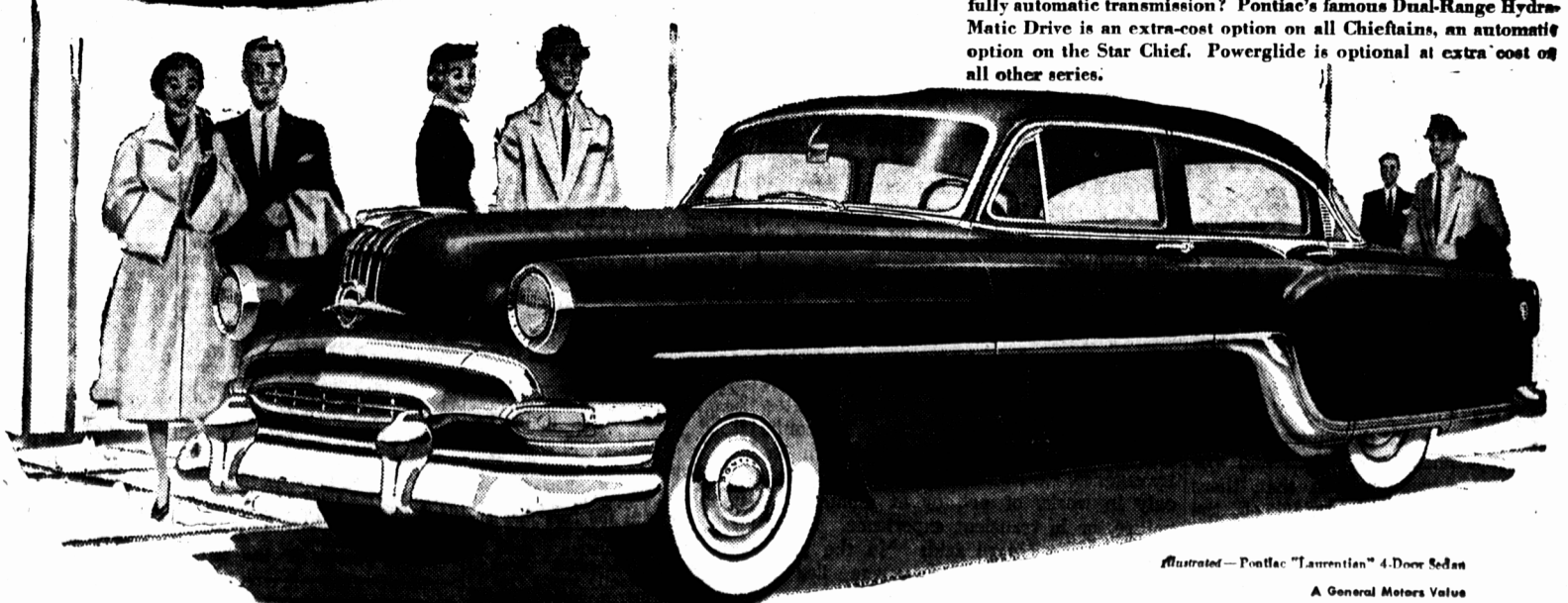
