

Yesterday's Gold Medalist aids Athletes of Today

MONTREAL (CP) — Stacked up against the athletes of today, the old-timer was a second-rater, says George Hodgson, winner of two gold medals for Canada in the Olympics 50 years ago.

They take it serious nowadays," the 69-year-old retired investment counsellor said in an interview. "In my time the approach was much lighter."

As a strapping 18-year-old, Hodgson was a top freestyle swimmer—events—400 metres and 1,500 metres—at the 1912 Games in Stockholm.

"It was not nearly so formal then," he said. "At nights we used to sit around Stockholm's sidewalk cafes and drink beer together. In the mornings and afternoons we would compete."

How far have swimmers come since then?

Hodgson's medal-winning times were 5:24.4 in the 400

metres and 22 minutes flat in the 1,500.

New Australia's young John Konrads holds the world records for both distances. His mark for the 400 is 4:15—more than a minute faster than Hodgson's. For the 1,500, it's 17:11, almost five minutes faster.

"For young athletes today, sport is a virtually full-time occupation," said Hodgson. "They train a couple of hours every day. In my era, nobody did that."

In the pre-Olympic year of 1911, Hodgson also competed in the British Empire Games at London and won the mile swim.

"Before that race I recall thinking I would my time had been for the mile. I told them I didn't know. I had never gone a mile before."

Canada won the unofficial games title that year, "somebody I'd bet would not many people know," said Hodgson.

First place is at stake tonight in the Island Senior Hockey League when Sandy's Parkdale Royals host Prince County Combines at the arena.

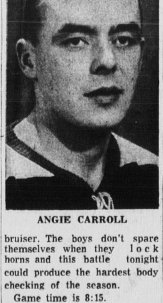
The Royals own a one point margin over the Ron MacArthur Combines and Bob Whitlock and his band are talking in terms of making that difference three long.

Judo Acquiring Olympic Status

LONDON (CP) — Judo's rise to Olympic status lifts it from being just a useful activity for nightclub bouncers.

Britain's 100,000 or so exponent of oriental wrestling will fight it out for places on the national team that goes to Tokyo where judo makes its Olympic debut in 1964.

Many feel the inclusion of judo in the games program gives several sure-fire gold medals to the Japanese. But recently Japan has been in the thick of its traditional sport.

A giant Dutchman, Anton Geinick, was responsible for partially eclipsing the rising sun at the world championships in Osaka last year. He outwitted Japan's Koji Sone to become the first non-Japanese to win the heavyweight title.

Britain also has some very tusslers. Trevor Leggett, a 49-year-old broadcasting executive, is rated No. 1 in the world of holding a "sixth dan."

Track, Field Coach Krause Gains Prominence Galore

TRAIL, B.C. (CP) — The emergence of Willi Krause as a big name in Canadian track and field coaching should come as no surprise.

He came to Canada only four years ago, but under his wing have gathered Diane Gerace, Canadian high jump champ, Gerry Moro, national pole vault champion, and Bob Yard, Canadian junior record-holder in the same sport.

Cap that with Krause's background and training methods and it starts to add up.

Back in West Germany, where he spent a decade after leaving Berlin at his end, Krause coached Erika Fisch in the Olympics as a broad jumper. She now holds the world's record for the hurdles.

But he wanted to come to Canada, and applied for immigration papers in 1956. They came through a year and a half later and Krause—a pattern maker by trade—ended up in Trail, where he took a job with the school board.

Friends talked him into attending a meeting of track club officials, and that started it.

"I look over the club with just a handful of youths to work with," says Krause, now 53.

Then Gerry Moro and Diane Gerace started showing up. They were the two best I had. They worked hard and listened to me."

This, in sum, is what they listened to.

"You have to have three things to make a good athlete. First is strength, second is

speed, and third is perseverance. Without all three you will be nothing."

"When you come out to train, you have to work hard with weights, then run for an hour to loosen the muscles. But you have to work hard all the time."

After the 1960 Olympics all coaches said that you must use weights to build up the body. This is not the only thing you must have. You have to have the speed to go with it.

"Like when you look at an animal. They have the long, slender muscles. They are strong, and they are fast. This is what you have to have in the athletes."

NAPA, Calif. (AP) — Eddie Machen, the No. 1 ranked heavyweight boxing contender who has been in a mental institution almost a week, was in a "very disturbed condition" Monday, the head of the institution said.

Dr. The Miller, staff superintendent and medical director of Napa State Hospital where Machen was taken last Wednesday after apparently committing suicide, said Machen's condition varies from day to day.

"Sometimes he's better, sometimes he's worse. Today he's not getting along too well."

Superior Court Judge Philip Lynch was to hold a hearing today as a result of his ordering Machen detained at Napa for his own protection.
