The Queen on the prosecution of William Allan vs. Thomas McCloskey, for an assault.

The prisoners George Swan and Thomas McCloskey, on being arraigned on the bills found against them, pleaded guilty.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

BERLIN, June 26. Congress to-day discussed the southern boundary of Roumelia, and the appointment of a governor for that province, who is to be a Christian, and is to be appointed by the Porte with the approval of the Powers.

England, Austria and Russia being generally agreed on the questions concerning Bessarabia, Servia, Montenegro, Epirus and Thessaly, no difficulty is expected on these points.

The Berlin Provincial Correspondent confirms the report of the new States, especially Bulgaria, is now substantially arranged; and adds that the really peaceful intentions, which rendered the solution of this problem possible, are guaranteed for the speedy and final conclusion of peace.

LONDON, June 26. The Times Vienna correspondent, discussing the Turkish frontier line along the Balkans, from a military point of view, says it is a line not to be easily defended, as in consequence of the concessions made to Russia, it is a broken line at least one-third longer than it would have been if the line of the Balkan Mountains had been closely followed.

The Daily Telegraph's Vienna correspondent says: "As the result of pour parlez between the Plenipotentiaries regarding Greece, it is proposed that the Hellenic question be settled directly between Greece and the Porte within the limits designated by Congress."

Austria will also be empowered by Congress to treat with the Porte respecting the future of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

A Terrible Scene.

A WIFE CUTS HER HUSBAND'S HEAD OFF BECAUSE HE FINDS A FLY IN THE GRAVY.

A dispatch from Burkeville, Va., to the Cincinnati Enquirer explains how the town was thrown into a terrible excitement the other day over a domestic tragedy of almost unparalleled atrocity, in which Jennie Miller beheaded her husband, Anderson Miller, while he was at breakfast. It seems that he was of a cool, quiet temper, but she notorious as a Tartar. The two had been seated at the table a few minutes when Mr. Miller ventured to remark: "Wife, here is a fly in the gravy." At this Mrs. Miller screamed out, "That's the way with you, you are all the time finding fault." The husband said, "Oh, no; I just happened to see the fly and thought I would tell you." The spunky woman replied, "You're a liar; flies never get into my gravy." Words multiplied, and in a little while Mrs. Miller was walking around the room, smashing up the furniture. Finally the husband ordered the wife out of the house. She ran and seized an axe which was on the porch, and rushing back to her husband dealt him a heavy blow on the back of the head while he still sat at the table. He tried to get up, but she repeated the blow, which felled him to the ground. Then, in her brutal rage, she severed head from the body. A guest of Mr. Miller's was up stairs while the bloody work was going on, and he got into the dining room just in time to see the end of it. As he entered the guilty woman held the head of her husband up, and with an exclamation, dropped it to the floor and fell into a swoon. The news of the murder spread rapidly, and Mrs. Miller was promptly arrested and lodged in jail. The Millers had been married about two years. His parents and friends advised him against the match, on account of her high temper, but little was it dreamed that that the result of the marriage would be so horrible.

Canadian Potatoes.

The Quebec papers report that a vast quantity of potatoes has been bought in that Province by American buyers, the Canadian grower receiving the American market price less fifteen cents a bushel which the grower contributes to the United States treasury for the duty. The buying season begins in November and closes at the end of June. Of the extent of the trade an idea may be formed from the report for 1877 of Mr. Howell, the United States Consul at Quebec, now Consul at Toronto. He says: "I find that during the period between the middle of November and the last of June there were certified for exportation at the four consulates in the Province, invoices for 782,732 bushels of potatoes. The quantities, with the average value at the different points were as follows:—

These potatoes at 15 cents a bushel paid duties into the United States Treasury to the amount of \$117,309.80.

In other words the farmers of Quebec lost \$117,409 through not having a home market, and being compelled to pay the American duty.
