**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

—Reports from Cape Town say the Boer prisoners taken at Paarlberg numbered over four thousand. Lord Roberts in his report only estimated them at 3,000. Evidently his successes are not of the kind that are minimized by being enquired into.

—The Montreal Star remarks that many of the Liberal newspapers are systematically suppressing the facts relative to the street demonstration of Friday, and the destruction of the British flag. The Witness has refused to suppress the facts and is conspicuous for its refusal.

—A curious result of the South African campaign, pointed out by the Montreal Gazette has been the diminution of crime in the Old Country. It is remarked all over that at the recent assizes at Manchester, which is in the centre of a very large population and usually offers from 50 to 100 criminal cases, there were only ten. The reason is that so many men have been sent out of the country that, trade being good, there is an active demand for labor, and work is plentiful. The sociologists set down "lack of employment" as one of the chief incentives of crime.

**NEW DOMINION FACTORY.**

Pursuant to notice the annual meeting of the New Dominion Dairying Company was held in their factory on Tuesday the 6th inst. The Company was well represented by shareholders and patrons. The Secretary, Mr. G. Wilson submitted his report outlining the work of the past year, which was unanimously adopted.

A dividend of 8 per cent was declared on all paid up stock, after paying a debt of \$500 on the butter plant.

After some routine business regarding the work for the ensuing year, the following board of directors was duly elected by ballot: D. Currie, (re-elected); Thos. E. Murphy, (re-elected); Thos. Lowther, (re-elected); Jas. McLean, (re-elected); D. T. McEwen, (re-elected); N. D. McLean, (re-elected); and A. Livingstone.

Mr. John McLean was appointed auditor, and an appropriation of \$50.00 was made for a salesman.

After singing the National Anthem, and giving three rousing cheers and a tiger for our Canadian Soldiers in South Africa, the most harmonious and successful annual meeting of this Company came to a close.

**FLOUR AND CORN MILL.**—A flour and corn mill is about to be started at Sydney, C. B.

**NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.**—A \$7,000 brick of gold came in Monday to George A. Pyke from the Richardson gold mine, the result of last month's work at that property. —Halifax Herald.

**TO MANAGE BRAZILIAN.**—Mr. Joseph C. Mann, owner of Brazilian, 2241, by Brown Wilkes, has placed his stallion in the hands of D. S. Mann, of Peticodiac, who will manage him in the stud next season. Brazilian is the sire of several of the fastest horses bred in Canada.

**WOMAN WITH A WHEEL.**—A woman of Bath, Me, has just written to the Mayor of Galesburg, Ills., that in 1896 she rode through his town on a bicycle at night without a light and would like him to tell her a suitable fine which she can pay and thus relieve her stricken conscience.

**THE BIRD MADE TO SING.**—The Amherst Daily News says: "A well known citizen of Victoria Street, who is supposed to entertain a feeling of sympathy for the Boers, was last evening invited by quite a large and very persuasive gathering to come to the door of his residence and sing the national anthem, which he very obligingly did, and sang it very well, too."

**THE STRATHCONA HORSE.**—It is stated that the stay in Montreal of the Strathcona Horse is not likely to extend over three hours, and the reception will have to be arranged accordingly. A favored idea as to form of the function is a lunch at the Windsor Hall, to which, of necessity, only a limited number of outsiders will be able to gain admission.

**FOR NEW BRUNSWICK SOLDIERS.**—In the estimates submitted by Provincial Secretary Tweedie \$5,000 is set aside for the assistance of New Brunswick volunteers in South Africa. Mr. Tweedie explains that \$1,000 of this amount has been given to the Provincial Patriotic fund, and that it has not been fully decided by the Government how the remaining \$4,000 will be appropriated.

**SOCIETY AT SOUTH LAKE.**—A correspondent says that a very successful social was held at South Lake schoolhouse last week. The programme was admirably carried out, and to particularize would be unnecessary. Miss May E. McDonald's recitation was finely rendered. Our worthy secretary, Mr. Francis McKinnon, and Mrs. McKinnon deserved much praise, the social attaining such success through their untiring efforts.

**ASTONISHING SURGERY.**—Among the wounded soldiers who arrived at Southampton from South Africa recently was Private O'Leary, whose case is remarkable. He was shot in the head during the battle of Colenso. The bullet lodged in his brain, rendering O'Leary speechless, sightless and paralyzed. His life was despaired of, but Sir William McCormac, president of the Royal College of Surgeons, who was acting as volunteer surgeon with the British Army in South Africa, removed a portion of the wounded man's brain, extracted the bullet and O'Leary has since practically recovered his lost senses.

**ENTERTAINMENT AND SOCIAL.**—The entertainment and social held in East Baltic hall last week was a grand success. Notwithstanding the unfavorable weather and the bad state of the roads the hall was filled to its utmost capacity. The programme was rendered in such good style as to maintain the reputation of the place in the line of entertainments. After the rendition of the programme came the sale of baskets for all of which good prices were realized. They were auctioned by Mr. Malcolm McPhee in his usual good style. A snug sum was realized for the completion of the interior of the above hall.

**OBITUARY.**—It is with deepest regret that we chronicle the death of Mrs. Jas. R. McDonald, of Arnsdale, Lot 42, which occurred on March 5th, at the advanced age of 78 years. The deceased possessed many noble traits of character and by her ever obliging and genial disposition made for herself many friends. Her death will be sincerely mourned by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. During her illness Mrs. McDonald was fortified by the last rites of the Catholic church by her kind pastor, Rev. Peter Cutran. On Wednesday, March 7th, her remains were conveyed to St. Margaret's church where the last sad rites were performed by the rev. pastor, after which her body was laid to rest in the cemetery. **CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION AT BRADALBANE.**

Vigorous animation, concordant unanimity, and business-like enthusiasm were the characteristics of the Liberal-Conservative Convention at Bradalbane on Tuesday, 6th inst. The convention, was composed of five representatives from each poll in the First District of Queen's and many other interested parties, and the object was to nominate two candidates to contest the district at the coming local election. Animated by the zeal that is always displayed by energetic workers in a good cause, the delegates transacted the business of the meeting so vigorously and so unanimously as to place this convention on record as one of the most significant that the First District has seen for years. Hon. Wm. Campbell and Mr. D. B. McLeod were proposed as candidates for the coming election, and when the proposition was put to the large and representative meeting not one voice was heard to dissent.

Before and after the nomination speeches were made by the candidates named and by Messrs. W. H. Hogan, Hope River, J. J. Bradley, Kelly's Cross, Dr. R. McNeill, Stanley, and Arthur Simpson, Bay View. All were strong in their condemnation of the scandalous and ruinous policy of the party now in office (but not in power), the party that has saddled on this beautiful Island a load of debt under which it for years must groan; the party that has made a scandalous bungle of the Public Works Department, leaving roads and bridges in an almost impassable condition, and allowing the inmates of the insane asylum to be badly fed and almost frozen; the party that has turned the Education Office into a political machine; the party that has employed every means of bribery and corruption to secure the election of their "heelers" and to induce desertion from the ranks of their opponents; the party that has the impudence to hang on to office after it has lost the support of the electorate and in its dire extremity has to send one man across the ocean and bring another across the continent with the desperate hope of being able to face another session; in a word, the party that has proved itself so false to all promises and to the few good traditions of its ancestors and that must, at the next local election, betake itself to the winter quarters of feeble opposition where its political thermometer will sink to 0; then the noble, the grand and the true Conservative party will ride in, in the full bloom of good government, to relieve the wants and woes of a long suffering and down-trodden country and to restore contentment and prosperity to the people of Prince Edward Island. In the course of the debate the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

Whereas, the large and important sections of country lying between the main line of the P. E. Island Railway and New London on the north side, and Crapaud on the south side, are still without railway accommodation;

And Whereas, the railway bill of 1896 provided for the construction of branch railways to the aforesaid places;

And Whereas, the building of these branch lines has, at different times and places, been endorsed by Sir Charles Tupper, Hon. G. E. Foster, Hon. J. G. Haggart and Senator Bower as the policy of the Conservative party;

And Whereas, the building of branch lines to the aforesaid localities would greatly increase the traffic on the main line of the P. E. Island Railway as well as give the much-needed accommodation to the inhabitants of the localities through which they would pass;

Therefore Resolved, That our representatives both in the Local Legislature and in the Dominion Parliament be urged to use their best endeavors to the end that these branch railways may be speedily constructed.

The following officers were elected: President, Mr. D. B. McLeod, Bradalbane; Vice President, Dr. R. McNeill, Stanley; Secretary, Mr. M. Ready, Irishtown.

The meeting closed with cheers for Hon. D. Gordon, Hon. Wm. Campbell, Mr. D. B. McLeod and the Canadian Contingent.
