SOURIS—Three persons, who came to this province from Holland, received their Canadian citizenship here yesterday at a ceremony in the court house. Judge J. Sylvère DesRoches of Montague presided.

Those receiving citizenship were: Johanna Van't Veld of Bear River; Ryk Van't Veld, Fortuna Bridge; and Michael Keus, Jr., East Baltic.

After the legal requirements had been completed, Judge DesRoches spoke briefly, congratulating the new citizens and welcoming them to Canada.

Eaton's Plans New Store In Montreal Shopping Area

John David Eaton, president of Eaton's of Canada, Tuesday announced plans to build a branch store—the first in the Province of Quebec—in the proposed new Fairview-Pointe Claire Shopping Centre near Montreal. Construction is scheduled to begin in the spring of 1964.

The new Eaton's store will be a completely modern 2-storey building of approximately 110,000 square feet, with provision for the addition of one or more floors at a later date. Architectural details are still being developed, the announcement said, but present plans call for a full-line department store suited to the market area, and designed to meet the specific shopping needs of the fast-growing community.

The area has a population of over 120,000 which is predicted will more than double during the next seven years.

The Pointe Claire store will be the 11th to be opened in a shopping centre by Eaton's since the company launched its Canada-wide expansion program about 10 years ago. Largest of its suburban stores is nearing completion in the Yorkdale Shopping Centre in Metro Toronto, and will be in operation late next year.

A large Simpson's store is also under construction in Yorkdale, marking the first time the two companies have established

56,000 To Be Eligible To Cast Ballots April 8

There will be something more than 56,000 persons eligible to vote in Prince Edward Island on April 8, figures received from the three returning officers reveal.

Panel MacLean, DeGroot and Marsh, said there will be more than 10,000 eligible in Kings when the lists are revised. There were 9,961 in the first list, compiled after the enumeration completed their work, and "there always are names added," he said. Tobacco Men Optimistic

All of the tobacco grown here last year has been shipped, with the exception of one small load, it was learned Tuesday from David Peacock, provincial department of agriculture. Mr. Peacock said the average production for 1962 will be down 200 to 300 pounds from the 1961 figures, although one or two top growers are close to the previous figures.

Average production in 1961 ran around 950 pounds per acre, though one crop ran slightly more than 1,200 pounds, and several others approached that figure.

The wettest season on record here, with a minimum amount of sunshine, combined with an early frost that hit several growers hard, to reduce the over all 1962 yield here, Mr. Peacock observed. The quality is also down, he added.
