## Visit Of Nehru To Peiping Might Produce Results

It might be a good thing for the world at large if Prime Minister Nehru of India accepts the Chinese Communist invitation to visit Peiping.

Nehru, straddling the fence between East and West, is attempting to maintain a show of complete detachment. He says he wishes India to retain her freedom of decision on individual issues rather than to cast her lot unequivocally with one side or the other.

In the meantime, he is working toward Indian leadership of Asia, which he conceives of as still in revolt against foreign hegemony and bound up in a new nationalism.

He agrees that Communism is being misused by some countries but — and here is where he diverges from the general concept — he doesn't think that Chinese Communism is Moscow Communism.

Nehru thinks the Chinese are too individualistic, have too many of their own problems. In other words he doesn't believe Mao Tse Tung and the Chinese Communist leaders who reiterate their unity with Moscow.

New York Times this Sunday said Nehru intimated in an interview, although not with a specific statement, that he felt the Western Powers should try to make common cause with the Nationalist forces in Asia whether they are communistically inclined or not.

This idea that Communism in Asia and especially China is different or can be made different from Russian Communism is to overlook the source of the power which spreads it in the area, and to hope for Titoism without remembering that Titoism is still a totalitarianism and that Asia is not Yugoslavia.

Nehru, of course, is caught up by some practical as well as theoretical aspects of the situation. It would be strange if, having spent so many years in British jails, he were not influenced by anti-westernism despite his admittedly great intelligence and education.

It would also be strange if he were not affected by the fundamentals of politics and geography with which he is faced. China is his near neighbor, larger and quite probably stronger, militarily, than India. To get along with China is bound to be an increasingly important factor in Indian foreign policy.

But to get back to the Peiping invitation.

Nehru, even if he now seems to be off base regarding the Communists, is a man of generally broad outlook. He does not refuse to learn. He might learn much from seeing the Peiping Communists with their ears to the ground for Moscow's word, or actually asking for instructions.

There is no doubt of his importance. If he perceived, it would mean much to the world struggle.

## Fail To Settle Dispute Between India-Pakistan

KARACHI, Pakistan, Aug. 23 — (AP) — Sir Owen Dixon, United Nations Mediator, said his efforts to end the dispute between India and Pakistan over Kashmir have ended in stalemate.

Before leaving for London en route to report to the U. N. Security Council, Sir Owen said in a 1,500-word statement that he felt there was nothing more he could do to end the dispute.

"I regret to announce that I have come to the conclusion that there is no immediate prospect of India and Pakistan composing any of their differences over the state of Jammu and Kashmir."

He said, however, that he still believes the two countries could resolve the problem of the area which lies between them through direct negotiations.

"I trust that they will," he added.

"No purpose can be served by my remaining any longer in the sub-continent."

## Engine Rips Top From Plane Over Rockies

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 22 — (AP) — A runaway engine flew off and ripped open an American Airlines plane like a giant can opener high over the Colorado Rockies early today, but the ship landed safely 19 minutes later.

One passenger aboard the plane, bound from Los Angeles to Chicago and New York, died of a heart attack and 52 passengers and five crew members suffered minor burns and injuries from oil and debris.

The injured, treated at hospital and later released, included Sugar Messenger, 36, of Toronto who was flying in the darkness at 21,000 feet and 300 miles an hour. Many passengers were asleep. One woman had taken off her girdle to rest more easily.

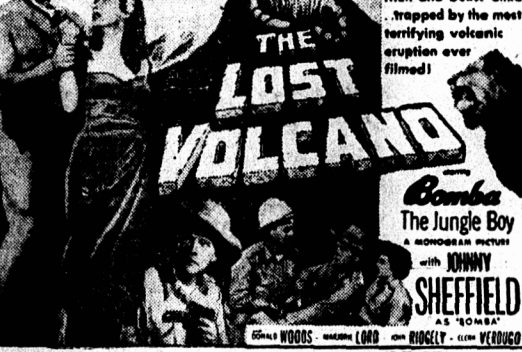
"Suddenly there was a boom, a flash and a rush of air," said James Mackris, 27, of Detroit, who was sitting in the front seat. The airplane was torn away, window-to-window, over the three forward rows of seats.

Jack Kravoy, 54, of Los Angeles became ill and slumped over of his wife; when the plane landed he was dead.

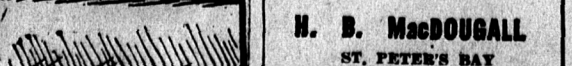
