

Fullmer Wins Unanimous Decision Over Robinson

By JACK HAND NEW YORK (AP)—Gene Fullmer, a bull-necked mauler from Utah's copper mines, floored 36-year-old Sugar Ray Robinson and cut his left eye with his relentless attack Wednesday night to win the world middleweight championship on a unanimous decision in a fierce 15-round battle.

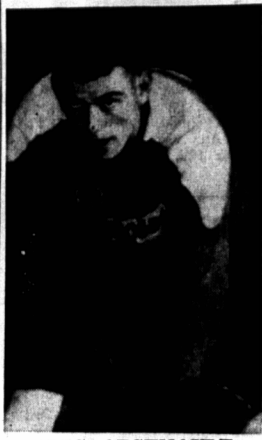
DETROIT'S PRODUCTION LINE

Pat Flaherty of Chicago won the race at an average speed of 128.49 m.p.h. Under the new rules, rookies must make 25-mile runs at 115, 120, 125 and 130 miles an hour. The first tests 20 years ago specified speeds ranging from 80 to 110.

The victory moved wings one point ahead of the idle Boston Bruins who have 46 points. The Leafs remained tied with New York Rangers in fourth place with 29 points but Rangers have played one game less.
