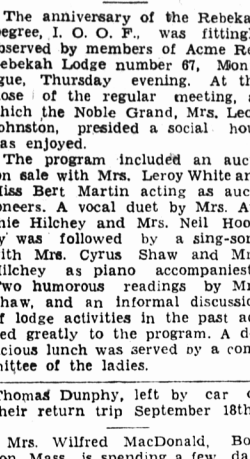

C.N.R. Expects Drop In Net Income This Year; Rates Hearing Continues

OTTAWA, Sept. 26 —(CP)—The Canadian National Railways told the Board of Transport Commissioners Wednesday it expects its 1952 net on Canadian operations lower than last year. It gave this evidence in support of a railway application for higher freight rates, saying its net railway operating income in Canada—the big item on the C. N. R.'s books will be down to an estimated \$19,916,000 from last year's \$21,761,000. The figure would fall short of meeting the government line's fixed charges of about \$24,000,000 a year, though it will be reinforced by a few millions from United States lines. The U. S. figures were not placed before the board. The fixed-charges figure was revised downward only at the last session of parliament, in the hope of having the company break even in normal years. Previously, it had to pay some \$46,000,000 a year in interest on obligations held by the government and public. Parliament also ordered the C. N. R. to pay income taxes like any other corporation, but from the figures submitted the board today it appeared the \$2,300,000,000 system might have only a tiny surplus on which to pay tax despite prospective highest gross revenues in its history.

Earlier in this week's hearing on the railway application for a general eight-per-cent boost in rates, the Canadian Pacific Railway said its net earnings this year are expected to fall about \$6,000,000 short of meeting the \$46,600,000 figure allowed it by the board to cover fixed charges, dividends and surplus.

In Wednesday submission presented by comptroller T. J. Gracey, the C.N.R. forecast gross Canadian operating revenues of \$582,394,000—up \$44,000,000 over last year. But at the same time operating expenses jumped \$44,000,000 to \$560,816,000.

Taxes other than federal income tax, rose another \$2,000,000, and there were other minor expenses increases.

Hugh O'Donnell, senior C. N. R. counsel, told the board he presumed there would be a further freight-rate application in the event of new wage increases. (This would be in addition to a nine-per-cent increase application now pending before the board, and the current eight-per-cent case. The nine-per-cent case has been set down for hearing later this fall.)

The C.N.R.'s statement Wednesday calculated that the company would gross about \$22,000,000 a year from an eight-per-cent rate boost. For a full year—on the basis of current traffic and expenses—that would give the company \$45,000,000 before meeting fixed charges and income taxes.

Wage Increase Expected

On such a basis, the C. N. R. would wind up with a surplus of about \$10,000,000. However, there is no chance of that, with an inevitable wage increase in the offing.

Before the C. N. R. opened what was expected to be a brief presentation, the C. P. R. concluded its 2-1-2-day case for an increase with evidence from Fred V. Stone, its research chief.

Mr. Stone's testimony centred around the contention that the railways are victims of—rather than contributors to—inflation. He was under cross-examination almost all day from counsel for the eight provinces opposing rate increases, all except Ontario and Quebec.
