Souris Doctor Is Featured In Medical Ass'n Magazine

Dr. Edward Kassner, Souris, president of the Prince Edward Island division of the Canadian Medical Association, is featured in a cover story in the December issue of the professional magazine, "Canadian Doctor".

Dr. Kassner's portrait, painted by an artistically inclined medical student, Jean Lapierre, Montreal, appears on the cover. The story relates Dr. Kassner's early experiences as a young medical doctor. Educated in Vienna, and graduating from the University of Vienna, he was forced to flee Austria following the German invasion in 1939.

He fled to England, where he lived with friends for some time before being sent to Canada, where he was interned at Brownsville, P.Q., having been classed as an enemy alien under security regulations.

Of this the magazine story says he "was a victim of a contretemps of Canada's freedom — by force of circumstance — lagged with the same stigma that characterized active war-time prisoners from Europe."

After two years in the camp, he was released and became a chief resident surgeon at what is now known as the Reddy Memorial Hospital, Montreal.

Ship Returns To Murray H.

Population Of Britain Increases

LONDON (Reuters) — More migrants entered Britain than left during 1961, boosting the population by 170,000 to an estimated 53,625,000, it was announced.

Statistics for 1961 issued by the Overseas Migration Board said that while rising immigration reached an estimated 100,000 from mid-1961 to mid-1962, 83,000 emigrants departed.

Immigrants to Australia fell to 127,568 from 139,371 in 1961, while emigrants from Australia rose to 39,147 from 46,565.

Rustico Harbor Problem Studied

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian scientists have rolled back the passage of time in a unique attempt to unplug a sand-choked east coast harbor entrance and make it possible to span the channel with a bridge.

The research in a large-scale model, the waves and tide actions which over a period of years shifted huge amounts of sand into the harbor entrance, causing it to widen and become shallower.

The object of the research project by the hydraulics laboratory of the National Research Council was Rustico Harbor on the north coast of Prince Edward Island.

Its aim was to find a way to create a single navigable channel in the harbor entrance for fishing boats, and to prevent sand erosion by tide and wave action around the foundations of

a bridge to be built over the entrance.

The council says completion of the experimental investigation of the mechanics of sand inlet formation in the harbor by tides and waves has provided a basic understanding of why the entrance has become choked with sand and become wider and shallower.

"On this basis it has become possible to determine the type of layout necessary to stabilize the inlet channel to the harbor," the council says. "Tests are continuing to determine the appropriate dimensions and configuration for the required structures."

At present fishing vessels have difficulty travelling through the sand-plugged channel to the harbor proper. The continual movement of sand would also have a serious effect on any bridge piers.

Until about 1959 the entrance channel to Rustico Harbor was about 400 feet across. The water was deep enough for fishing boats.

However, the channel changed after 1956 as a result of construction of a causeway linking nearby Rustico Island, just east of the harbor entrance, with the mainland.

The combined effect of waves and increased sand swept into the harbor widened the entrance to nearly one-half mile and seriously reduced the depth of water.

With the scale model, the laboratory determined the exact nature of the changes which occurred in the channel as a result of the building of the causeway and why they occurred.

social and international peace."

Pope John referred to the recently ended first session of the Vatican Ecumenical Council as "a bright beacon raised over the eternal city."

He said the tone result of the council had been the spontaneous revelation, almost unexpected by most people or a sense of unity, "of those of the attraction, informed, conscious, well-received, toward Christian brotherhood."

He said there were few times in the 20 centuries of Christianity that the desire for unity had been felt so ardently. It was a serious obligation on each one's conscience, the Pope went on, and Catholics should dedicate themselves anew to the task of establishing an abiding love for unity.

On the day of judgment, he said, each person would be asked whether he had prayed and worked and suffered for unity.

SERVED SERVANTS
Pope John said that in his four years as pontiff his constant endeavor had been to act as the "servant of the servants of God, who is in truth the Lord and Prince of Peace."

He added: "Let peace then be our objective at all times: Let us aim at creating peace around us so that it may spread throughout the entire world."

The Pope said it was his wish that this "should be a Christmas of prayer and reflection, to correspond to the earnest desire of Jesus Christ for the unity of believers in His name and His gospel: That they may be one."

Steel Output Remains High

CLEVELAND (AP) — Steel production for 1962 could total slightly more than last year's 98,000,000 ingots, for despite trimmed production this week and next because of the holidays, steel magazine says.

"There's still a chance that December's output will be the largest of any month since April," the metalworking journal explains. "If production reaches 7,000,000 tons, it will top November's output."

The weekly publication says output this week will be a little less than the 1,300,000 ingot tons it estimates the industry poured last week.

Its price composite on a steelmaking raw material, No. 1 heavy melting scrap, stayed at \$25 a gross ton last week.

Steel says automotive steel buying remains excellent and shows no signs of weakening with new car sales in early December setting a record for the period.

Hospital Services Commission

The Hospital Services Commission of Prince Edward Island has received copy of a Minute of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council dated December 13, 1962 No. 946/62 — stating as follows:

"Council did and doth hereby direct that, effective December 1, 1962, all residents of this Province shall be entitled to medically necessary insured services without charge, providing that they have been resident in this Province for not less than three months immediately before the services are received.

Council further directs that the Hospital Services Commission initiate the necessary procedures to refund all premiums paid in advance to provide insured services after November 30, 1962."

This eliminates the need for payment of premiums to establish eligibility under the Hospital Insurance Plan.

Initial procedures to refund premiums paid for coverage after November 30, 1962 are being taken, and refunds will be made when checking and auditing is complete.
