Whole New Constitution Is NDP Centennial Project

OTTAWA (CP) — The New Democratic Party has put forward a new centennial project—a completely revamped Canadian constitution.
T. C. Douglas, national leader, presented an outline of NDP constitutional views at a press conference. A main point was overhaul of the constitution, embodied in the British North America Act, by 1967.
Mr. Douglas said the act is obsolete in many ways. The functions of government had changed drastically since the act was drawn up.
The government's proposed formula for amending the constitution might be adopted before there is a thorough signing of the B.A. Act he said such a move might mean legislators would find themselves hand-

Fish Packers In N.S. Oppose Nfld. Demands

HALIFAX (CP) — The Nova Scotia Fish Packers Association has opposed the demands of the Newfoundland government for federal permission to charter foreign registered trawlers to land catches of groundfish in Newfoundland ports.
Copies of a letter objecting to sanction by the federal government have been sent to the federal ministers of fisheries, transport and labor, the association said here.
The letter says use of foreign

trawlers has been requested to assist the new owners of North Eastern Fish Industries Limited of Newfoundland to assess the relative merits of different types of trawlers before acquiring the fleet they will need to provide fish for their operations.
The British firm of Birdseye Goods Limited, which has taken over the Newfoundland industry, proposes to build and equip a fleet of 25 trawlers.
The letter from the association said the proposal is unfair to many Canadian companies which have spent time and money investigating types of trawlers they ultimately purchased in the last two or three years.
Federal agreement to demands by the Newfoundland government would be "inconsistent with refusal in 1963 to permit charter of three British trawlers for one year to provide employment for Canso, N.S. operations while three new trawlers were being built in Canadian shipyards."

Anglican Laity Vote For Union With Methodists

LONDON (AP) — Laymen of the Church of England have voted for reunion with the Methodists who left the church two centuries ago.
The Church Assembly's House of Laity voted 128 to 28 for a motion on four basic points:
Organic union between the two churches as the ultimate goal.
Pursuit of that goal in two stages: Full communion leading to organic union.
Acceptance by the Methodist church of the English episcopacy, the hierarchy of bishops.
Formal reconciliation and integration of the ministries of the two churches.
A discussion has been carried on at various levels within both churches since a report on negotiations between them was published in February, 1963. The talks began in 1956.
The final decision, whether to go ahead will be taken on the Anglican side when the Canterbury and York convocations meet in May. The Methodists are taking votes on the issue at their quarterly meetings.

LAWS AMENDED

MONTREAL (CP) — City police have begun a campaign here to make jaywalking penalties less severe but more enforceable. They also plan to create an accident investigation squad in an effort to save lives and improve traffic law enforcement.
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Aid Claimed Being Aimed At Wrong Class

CALGARY (CP) — There are too many cases of voluntary welfare agencies gearing their program to the middle class instead of Canada's poor who really need assistance, says a Canadian Labor Congress official.
Clifford Scotton of Ottawa, secretary of the CLC's welfare services committee, told the biennial conference of the Community Funds and Councils of Canada that "in too many cases voluntary agencies tend to take on a middle-class orientation."
Mr. Scotton said here that in one Eastern Canadian city a recreational organization "serves the middle class to a large extent." Yet in the same city, a recreation group poorer families has to struggle with inadequate financing, equipment and personnel.
However, most voluntary groups are performing worthwhile services, he said.
