Stolen Safe Is Located; \$400 In Cash Still Missing

Late last night Summerside police were questioning a man in connection with the theft of a large safe stolen early Sunday morning from the office of Earl MacDonald, Mercury Meteor dealer, on Water Street East in Summerside.

The safe was discovered yesterday afternoon by persons travelling on a side road between Indian River and Malpeque, and was reported to police in Summerside.

Summerside Police Chief, Peter R. White, Constables Harry MacKay and Keith Champion, and Sgt. T. J. Keefe, RCMP, accompanied by the owner, Mr. MacDonald, went to the area where the safe was found in the ditch, and money, in the form of cheques was literally growing on trees. Securities were scattered about and clinging to the branches of nearby bushes.

A large hole had been chopped in the back of the safe, through which ledgers and other papers had been taken and left scattered around on the ground or blown about the area.

An estimated \$400 in cash was missing from the safe, but most

of the other securities amounting to approximately \$5,000 were recovered or accounted for.

Although damage resulted to papers and ledgers from the rough handling they received and from rain which fell on them, everything recovered may be salvaged except the damaged safe which had also been attacked from the top, apparently with an axe, with less success.

A tow truck with hoist, driven by William McLellan of Summerside, went to the area last night and brought the four-foot high safe back to the office from where it had been stolen.

On its return, and despite the breaking of the handle on the combination by the intruders who stole this heavy safe, Mr. MacDonald was able to open the safe door and recover the remainder of the ledgers and a few other papers which had not already been removed.

S'side Legion Will Mark V-E Day With Parade

The Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion will hold special services this Sunday May 10 to commemorate the 14th anniversary of V-E Day. Church services, a parade and march past and a memorial service at the Cenotaph will be included in the program.

The parade will form up in front of the Legion home at 10:30 a.m. and will be led by Sea Cadet Band under the direction of Lt. Gabriel Chissov, followed by veterans and other units. The parade will march to Trinity United Church where the Protestant party will fall out and the Roman Catholic members will proceed on to St. Paul's Church.

The parade will regroup at 12:10 p.m. at the corner of Notre

Dame Street and Central Street and move south to Memorial Square where a commemorative service will be held with wreaths and poppies being placed in remembrance of fallen comrades.

Mayor W.A. Currie will speak briefly and will be introduced by vice president of the Summerside Legion, Mercer Mullin. Prayer will be offered by Rev. C.R. Webber and Mr. Mullin will read the poem "They Shall Grow Not Old".

After-bulger A.C. Gallant has sounded reveille, Mr. Webber will pronounce the benediction. Lt.-Col. R.L. Mollison will lay the wreath on behalf of the branch with veterans laying individual poppies during which the salute will be taken by Francis MacNeil.

American Solo Artists Well Received At S'side

SUMMERSIDE—A program of folk music interpreted by Frances Archer and Beverly Gile was enthusiastically received last evening at Summerside Civic Auditorium as the Summerside Community Concert Association presented the last concert in the 1958-59 series.

Miss Archer and Miss Gile were heard in a program of international songs and ballads, ranging from the traditional English folk songs "Early One Morning" to the Welsh tune "Ar Hyd Y Nos" and the Japanese "Sakura" to the familiar Ameri-

can sea chantey "'A-Rovin'". The duo was introduced by the president of the Summerside Community Concert Association L. W. Hancock.

Blond Frances Archer from Texas and redhead Beverly Gile from California were members of a girls quintet in 1950 when they decided to join forces musically and become a duo. Thus began their endless search for the authentic folk music. Misses Gile and Archer experienced not only immediate success as concert folk singers but were signed by Disneyland Records as the company's first recording artists.

Lobster Catch Reported Low

Unfavorable weather was given last night as the chief reason for low lobster catches so far this season.

Alberton reported "just fair" catches yesterday. The best catch was about 700 pounds, but in the past catches have been known to be over 1,000 pounds after a weekend at the start of the season.

Summerside reported catches in that area poor so far. However a pickup is expected in the next few days. A spokesman said the catch is running behind that of last year at the same time.

Montague reported the catch in the Southern Kings area as very poor with less than two pounds per trap. There are still some traps to be laid in that area.

District Protection officer Warren Farrar said last night that the traps placed only last Thursday are not yet waterlogged and this plays a part in the low catch.

He said it is difficult at this early stage to predict whether or not it will be a good season. The best catches, he said, are made in the first four or five weeks in a normal season.

So far only a small amount of lobsters have reached Charlottetown and are reported selling at retail stores at 69 and 70 cents per pound.

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
