Judge Taschereau has been sworn to act on behalf of the Governor-General during the latter's tour of the west. The Hon. William Mulock is also formally chosen to administer the new department of labor created under the conciliation bill of the past session.

His wife and daughter will accompany him. Miss Alice Thomson, who is to be bridesmaid, left this morning. The marriage ceremony will be performed in the Presbyterian church.

General Sir George White was presented with a thoroughbred Irish charger, fully caparisoned, at the Balmoral Show Grounds Belfast, lately, and at the same time Lady White was presented with a magnificent diamond bracelet. The presentations were subscribed for by the working classes, who were present in large numbers, and accorded the hero of Ladysmith an enthusiastic welcome.

Sportsmen are evidently finding out about the great salmon and trout pools in Newfoundland, and every trip of the steamer Bruce from North Sydney carries many disciples of Isaac Walton. Judge Dodd, L. E. Roy Willis, W. H. and Blowers Archibald returned last Thursday after capturing some salmon and sea trout. The Judge landed a twenty pounder, while the hotel man landed a twelve pounder.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward M. Fox and two children, of Roxbury, Mass., arrived by train a few evenings since on a visit to Charlottetown. Mrs. Fox is a daughter of Mr. John G. J. Weldon, of this city, at whose home they are staying. Mr. Fox is of the firm of Allen & Fox, and carries on a large express business in Boston, Roxbury, the Highlands and other towns near Boston. Mr. Benj. Heartz, President of the Merchant's Bank of Prince Edward Island, and Senator Prowse and Mr. L. L. Beer, directors of the same institution, returned from Sydney on Saturday evening. While in Sydney they purchased the Mosely property for \$10,250, and will begin building as soon as the present tenants vacate the premises. In the meantime temporary quarters will be fitted up and the bank will be opened up as soon as possible.

Rev. James Brock, the oldest Methodist minister in Canada, if not in North America, died at his home in Kingston, Ontario, Tuesday. He was born in Longford County, Ireland, 95 years ago, coming out to Canada when 19 years old. He was enrolled as a British missionary, and is believed to be the last of that zealous band. He was among the first ordained into the Canadian Methodist Conference. He ministered to the condemned prisoners in Fort Henry, who were taken at the battle of the Windmill in 1837, and afterward executed.

—A great deal of definite and reliable information about our Canadian Contingents in South Africa will be found in a handsome publication entitled "Canadians in Khaki," for sale at the book-stores, price 25 cents. The work contains a corrected list of all the officers and men in South Africa of the first and second contingents, and Stratheona's Horse, also the R.M.C. graduates serving in the present war. After each man's name is noted his previous war services, and casualties up to date are also included. The introduction is a concise history of the sending of Canada's various contingents, from the pen of the wife of an important officer in the militia, who had herself much to do with the movement to keep the soldiers supplied with comforts while on the voyage to Africa and while in the field. Included in this introduction is the official correspondence between the Imperial and the Dominion Governments. The Canadian Patriotic Fund Association, the Soldiers' Wives League and the Red Cross Society, all of which have done excellent work in connection with the contingents, come in for their share of mention. The book is illustrated with portraits of Lord Roberts, Col. Otter, and others, and the frontispiece is a half-tone of the Queen, taken from her latest photograph.
