## Richmond Men Plead Guilty; Face Sentence For Robbery

SUMMERSIDE — Ivan Lewis and Joseph Gallant, Richmond, this morning pleaded guilty to the charge of unlawfully robbing Arthur Joseph LeClair of Miscouche of the sum of \$110 when they appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court.

Magistrate MacDonald remanded the two until June 18th, for sentence.

William Robinson MacPhail, Bonshaw, was also fined \$75 and costs for the same offence, SUSPENDED.

## Prince County Survey Reports Are Received

University of Canada has handed over to the provincial government advance copies of the firm's report on transportation and basic utilities in Prince County, and development and transportation representatives will meet today for the official presentation of the report, which deals with a survey made of Prince County, including population, industry, banking, customs, telecommunications, education, electric power, climate and zoning.

Total cost of the survey, which is entitled "Physical Aspects—Prince County Development Plan," runs to about \$20,000.

Report on another survey, undertaken by Arthur D. Little Incorporated at a reported cost of \$21,000, is expected within a few weeks.

Two of three reports from Combes Agriculture Services, Colorado Springs, on a number of County surveys, have been received by the government. Cost of the former work is between \$7,000 and \$8,000.
