Future Of Baby 'X' Still Uncertain

TORONTO, (CP)—"Baby X" moved out of Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children Thursday and into an uncertain future. He was released to his own mother, an unmarried 15-year-old redhead who looks little more than a child herself, and his grandmother. They turned him over to Mrs. Sicel Green, a Toronto resident, who will look after him for the present.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Shinder started steps to adopt him legally. They are the 39-year-old Brooklyn residents who authorities said tried in vain to pass normal adoption procedure and smuggle him aboard a New York-bound plane as his own child Feb. 25.

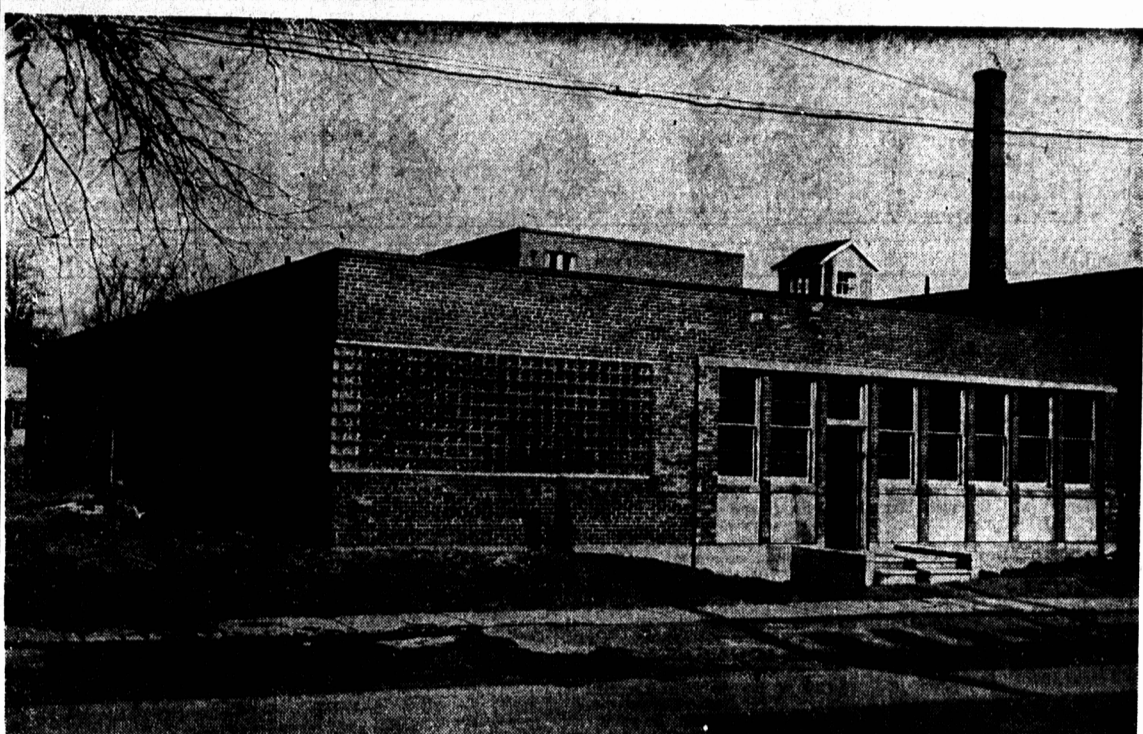
The childless Brooklyn couple previously had been refused a child by adoption agencies in the New York area on grounds their three-room apartment was considered too small and Shinder's salary as a haberdashery clerk inadequate.

Shinder was fined \$150 two days ago for helping to falsify a birth certificate for the baby. After United States immigration officials turned back the couple and police stepped into the case the baby was taken to the hospital to receive normal care.

The grandmother's consent was necessary before the hospital would let the eight-pound, 11-ounce baby go. In the eyes of the law, the baby's mother is herself a child. The infant still has no name except the first one given him by the Shinders, "Martin."

Although the youthful mother said Wednesday night she did not want to see the baby, she had to look at him Thursday when the nurses placed him in her arms. She handed him over to the waiting grandmother.

Chinese Wooing Japs With 30,000 Nationals

By SAM SUMMERLIN TOKYO, (AP)—Communist China is wooing Japan's masses with piecemeal gifts of the world's most precious bargaining commodity—human lives. Four large Japanese ships were bound today for Chinese Red ports. They will pick up the first batch of 30,000 Japanese nationals which China has offered to repatriate. In all, the Japanese government figures 50,000 civilian nationals have been stranded on the China mainland since the Second World War.

Seeking Friends Why did the Red rulers suddenly agree to let thousands of Japanese go home? The answer seems to be to win friends in the island empire, long China's worst enemy. Japan long had sought repatriation but Peiping turned a deaf ear until late last year.

Trade may be the key explanation, some authorities believe. As the United States and Britain tighten their economic blockade on the mainland, Red China flirts more and more for commerce with Japan.

With 30,000 hostages, Red China saw a golden opportunity to drive a wedge between the Japanese people and the pro-American government of Premier Shigeru Yoshida, observers say. Yoshida in Tight Spot Right now Yoshida is in a tight spot. He dissolved Japan's Diet during the week-end and called for new elections next month after that parliamentary body passed a non-confidence motion against him. Part of the opposition was based on charges that Yoshida's ties were too close to the U.S.

The time appears ripe for planting new seeds of discord. The first shipment of about 5,000 repatriates is expected to dock in Japan between March 25 and 30. The last are due in June or July.

The arrivals may heighten the Red campaign if large numbers come ashore singing the praises of China and Communism—only a few weeks before the voters go to the polls in a vital contest for leadership of this country.

Supreme Soviet

(Continued from Page 1) five promises in this order: To make the state even more powerful, tighten the bonds among various nationalities of the Soviet Union, strengthen the armed forces, better standards of living and guarantee the "unity" of party and government. He gave assurances that he was dedicated to the job of building for the Soviet people "a free and happy life" and of advancing on the path of Communism in brotherly unity.

Malenkov's name was placed before the delegates of the two houses, Soviet of the Union and Soviet of Nationalities, by Beria, who called Malenkov a "talented pupil of Lenin and a true comrade-in-arms of Stalin."

There wasn't much doubt about Malenkov's election. He already had been chosen March 6 at a joint session of the central committee of the Communist party, the council of ministers and the presidium of the Supreme Soviet, the three most powerful bodies in the land.

Government Reorganization

Malenkov's reorganization of the government carried forward a consolidation of ministries that was begun by these three powerful groups March 6. The old government had 54 ministries. The new government has only 26.

The biggest changes already had been announced. The most important Sunday knocked out the separate navy ministry, headed by Admiral N. Kuznetsov, and merged it with the ministry of defence headed by Marshal Nikolai Bulganin.

New Ministry

A big new ministry of culture, headed by a rising star, Panteleimon K. Ponomarenko, was created, replacing the ministry of high education, the committee on art, the ministry of labor reserves, the ministry of cinematography and the chief publishing administration.

For the first time Beria, Molotov, Bulganin and Lazar M. Kaganovich were listed as "first deputy" prime ministers, and A. I. Mikoyan, minister for foreign and internal trade, was listed as "deputy prime minister."

Malenkov declared all the measures of consolidation and merger had been planned while Stalin was still alive.

The Supreme Soviet unanimously approved the previous selection of Marshal Klementy Voroshilov as chairman of the presidium of the Supreme Soviet, a sort of figurehead president of the Soviet Union.

The Supreme Soviet elected Andrei A. Andreyev a member of the presidium of the Supreme Soviet. He takes the place vacated by V. V. Kuznetsov, the new deputy minister of foreign affairs who is being sent to Peiping as ambassador.

The members of the Benevolent Irish Society will hold their annual St. Patrick's Day parade this year on Tuesday, March 17th.

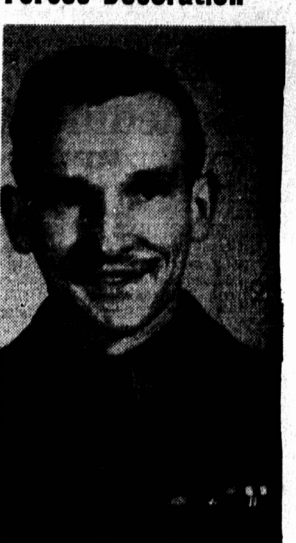
