

Mays Nips Chicago Cubs Detroit Trips Baltimore

NEW YORK (AP)—Billie Mays did it almost all by himself Wednesday accounting for all New York Giants runs in a 4-3 victory over Chicago Cubs.

After his 11th homer with two men on tied the score in the sixth. Mays walked, moved to second on a force play, stole third and raced home on catcher Cal Neuman's wild throw in the last of the ninth.

Singles by Ernie Banks, Walt Moryn and Chuck Tanner gave the Cubs a run in the first after two were out.

Bob Speake's single, Moryn's double, a single by Tanner and an infield out produced two more Chicago runs off Bartley in the third.

Bartley was lifted for a pinch hitter in the third and Al Worthington took over the job to earn his seventh victory.

Chicago starter Bob Rush was lifted in the seventh and reliever Turk Lown took the loss.

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Tigers blasted Art Ceccarelli for three first-inning runs—two of them on J. W. Porter's upper deck home run—and made them stand up for a 4-2 triumph Wednesday over Baltimore Orioles.

Lanky Jim Bunning spaced six hits to register the win.

Bob Nieman got a home run leading off in the second inning and Bob Boyd another in the sixth.

Bunning struck out seven and didn't walk a batter.

Charlie Maxwell singled with one out in the first and came all the way home when Al Kaline's blooper fell into short right field for a double. Porter followed with a drive into the upper left field seats.

Kaline's second double, leading off the sixth, started the final Detroit run. He came home on catcher Red Wilson's two-out double.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Charlie Neal drove in four runs with a triple and home run Wednesday night as Brooklyn Dodgers ended their losing streak at four games with an 11-9 victory over Milwaukee Braves which left both clubs tied for second place in the National League race.

The Brooks, who had scored only four runs in the skid, piled up a 9-1 lead in the first two in-

nings, then barely managed to hang on as the Braves let loose with a three-home run barrage in the last two frames.

Eddie Mathews and Hank Aaron batted home runs with none out in the ninth to chase reliever Ed Roebuck, who won his first of the year, but Clem Labine then came on to shut off the rally by retiring Joe Adcock, Bobby Thomson and Billy Bruton.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Home runs by Lou Skizas, Gus Zernial and Hal Smith Wednesday night gave the seventh-place Kansas City Athletics a 5-3 victory over the last-place Washington Senators in the first game of a double-header.

The homers were Skizas' 10th, Zernial's 13th and Smith's 9th of the year.

A roid Portocarrero scattered seven hits over seven innings to gain credit for the victory, his third against a one loss, Virgil Trucks held Washington to a single in the final two innings.

Says Unless Solution Found World Faces Atomic Holocaust

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A Canadian educationist said Wednesday the world faces an atomic holocaust unless it finds men who are willing and eager to find solutions to the problems which face it.

Dr. F. Cyril James, principal and vice chancellor of McGill University, Montreal, spoke at the 201st commencement of the University of Pennsylvania where he received an honorary doctor of science degree in economics.

Recalling the depression of the 1930's, he termed it "a problem of economic organization and of human understanding, a symptom of the limitations of the mind of man."

"What was needed was vision, the widening of the horizons of the mind in the effort to understand, and the courage to do things that had not previously been considered. There were men and women, thank God, whose mental horizons were wide and whose courage was undefeatable. They worked out policies that enabled this country and Canada to win through to a period of outstanding prosperity."

ISOLATION IMPOSSIBLE

As to other nations, he said "we have no clear aims for the world as a whole, and we are unwilling to co-operate with other nations, because we distrust them. We want to be left alone to enjoy our own way of life, and our prosperity, but this status is the one thing that is impossible."

"In terms of the upward march of mankind, we are in the midst of a great and dangerous depression. It cannot continue indefinitely.

"Either the world, losing rapidly its remaining shreds of confidence and half-hearted co-operation, will find some country starting hostilities before a dangerous adversary can seize the secret advantage and by that action destroying civilization in an atomic holocaust—or else there must be men whose minds are wide enough to encompass the whole world with all its many problems who are willing, and eager, to find solutions that look to the welfare of all mankind."

Banshee Jets Said Airworthy

HALIFAX (CP)—The Banshee jet fighters of the navy's air arm, grounded a week ago following two recent crashes, were pronounced airworthy Wednesday after engineers investigated causes of two recent crashes.

Naval officials did not disclose details of the investigations, but announced the 16 twin-jet Banshees can fly again without restriction. Following the second crash several weeks ago the planes were restricted to 325 miles an hour below 10,000 feet. The grounding order came one day later.

The starboard wing of a Banshee broke off over the harbor entrance here two weeks ago, resulting in the death of the pilot. Another Banshee pilot was killed May 14 at nearby Terence Bay when his aircraft plowed into a hill.

The 15 aircraft are stationed at nearby Shearwater, although the grounding order came when eight of them were participating in exercises at Rivers, Man.

The Banshees carry only the pilot.

The 600-mile-an-hour aircraft form the backbone of the navy's air power. They will go on the carrier Bonaventure this summer.

The planes normally carry rockets, but can handle bombs and cannon.

Remember When

Charlie Gardiner of the Chicago Black Hawks, one of the great goalies in hockey history, died 27 years ago today at age 30. The Scottish-born player who went to Chicago from Winnipeg was at the peak of his career, and only two months earlier had been a big factor in Chicago's Stanley Cup triumph over Detroit Red Wings by three games to one.

Luck Favors Teams That Can Take Advantage Of It

NEW YORK (AP)—Joe DiMaggio once authored a book about being lucky to be a Yankee, and recent developments indicate he wasn't fooling.

If it was a matter of luck when Hank Bauer tried to steal second with the bases loaded at Detroit, and all ending up safe with the winning run scoring, we aren't sure just what you would call it.

Which brings to mind that the Yankees currently are engaged in a series with Chicago White Sox which very well could determine whether New York is going to win the pennant, as per habit, or confound the experts by not winning.

They have two or three good men for every position and Casey Stengel could pick a lineup blindfolded which could win the pennant in a breeze.

LACK OF UNITY

It may be the Yankees have enough men for two or three good major league teams but not enough for one championship team. The fact Stengel has been shifting his lineup continually may indicate a doubt in his mind as to just which men belong in there.

The really great teams of the past had one lineup and barring injury necessitating a substitution, the lineup was in there day after day until the fans could name the batting order in their sleep.

The White Sox have been going along with pretty much the same lineup this year, and they're still leading the league.

What may be taken as a bad omen for New York is that, with the exception of Kansas City, it has been having trouble with the lower case clubs. It has won all six with the Athletics, but to date is even-strengthened with Baltimore and Washington, with four victories and four losses with each club.

The Yankees in the past have plastered the weaker teams, something practically all championship clubs must do. They lost only five to Washington all last year and nine to Baltimore.

But maybe we're underrating the other clubs. It may be their improvement rather than the Yankees' deterioration. Could be.

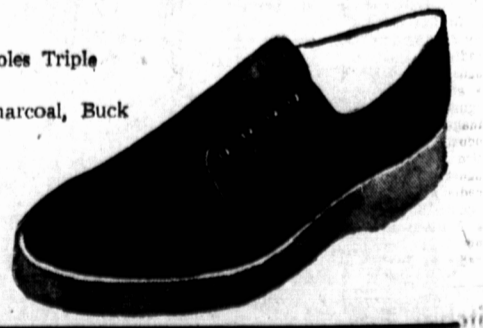
