THE death of the Marquis of Arlesbury is announced.

THE Dominion Parliament is officially summoned for the 7th of February.

ENGLISH MAILS.—Two English Mails arrived in this city on Tuesday evening.

THE steamer *Heather Belle* will be sold by public auction to-morrow, at twelve o'clock.

BARQT. *Wellington*, O'Callaghan, master, from this port, arrived at Plymouth via Queenstown on the 22nd ult.

DROWNED.—On Thursday evening last a man named Michael Driscoll fell off a wharf in St. John and was drowned.

INCENDIARY FIRE.—Taylor's general job factory at Fredericton was destroyed by fire on Sunday last. The fire was caused by an incendiary. Loss, \$1,200.

SCHR. *J. M. S.*, which was driven ashore at Pensacola during the gale on the night of December 23, lost bowsprit and both topmast; she also had her hull damaged.

THE brig, *Shamrock*, M. O'Connell, master, owned by Owen Connolly, arrived at London on the twenty-fifth December, making the passage from Georgetown in twenty-one days.

It is intimated in a portion of the English press that Earl Dufferin will not leave Canada this year when his term expires, but will remain until 1879, when he will succeed Lord Lytton as Viceroy of India.

SHOOTING ACCIDENTS.—James J. Gourly was fatally shot at a shooting match which took place a short distance from Truro on Christmas Day. Thomas Richardson, of St. John, was seriously wounded on Monday evening last by a shot from a revolver which was levelled at him by a boy named James Collins.

A GREAT LOSS.—Thirty-nine lives and seven vessels have been lost from the port of Gloucester, Mass., during the past year. The value of the vessels was \$22,926, insurance \$19,000. This is the smallest loss in number of vessels since 1868, the smallest in value of property since 1859, and the smallest in number of lives sacrificed since 1866. In 1876, twenty-seven vessels and two hundred and twelve lives were lost.

FAILURES IN MONTREAL.—A writ of attachment has been issued against Dennis Gervais, carriage maker; liabilities \$30,000. George Forbes, boot and shoe manufacturer, has called a meeting of his creditors; liabilities \$8,000. The liabilities of J. B. Lobelle, dry goods, who failed on Wednesday, are \$12,000, and assets \$15,000. The liabilities of E. Hudon, Jr., who failed recently, are \$50,000, and assets \$110,000.

DROWNING ACCIDENT AT HALIFAX, N. S.—On Saturday a cabman named John Wilson, in the employ of Edward Quinton, Halifax, took the girls, named Ida Boutilier and Clara McDonald, aged respectively 14 and 16, for a drive. Nothing more was heard of them till Sunday morning. The horse and cutter were found in Inglis St. During the afternoon a robe and whip were found near Steel's Pond, on Point Pleasant Road. On search being made the two girls were found in about five feet of water. A large crowd assembled and grappled for Wilson's remains, but up to a late hour they were not found. The road is very narrow at this point, the pond being on one side and the sea on the other. Friday night's storm covered the road with rocks and ice, and it is supposed that Wilson, in trying to avoid this debris, drove on the ice and broke through.

LOSS OF THE BRIG "ALEPPO."—The brig *Aleppo*, of Georgetown, A. S. Campbell, master, sailed from Liverpool, G. B. for Sydney, C. B., on the 8th Nov. last, in ballast. The captain reports that from the time of leaving port had very rough and tempestuous weather, but did not sustain any material damage until the night of the 14th November, when the gale rose with heavy squalls, until it became a hurricane. On the 15th, at 2 a. m., a tremendous sea struck the ship, throwing her on her beam ends, starting the after house, breaking in the after hatch, taking the main-boom and sheet clear away, as well as all the bulwarks on the lee side, and shifting the ballast all to leeward. Tried to get the ship before the wind, but she would not pay off; cut away the main-mast and used it for a drag from the lee quarter, but without effect. After a time secured a covering on the hatch, but the water taken in had washed all the ballast to leeward, the ship continuing to list more and more; when, to save her from turning over, cut away the fore-topmast, which took with it the masthead and all the yards attached. The pumps being choked, tried to keep the water down by bailing for two days, the vessel being a complete wreck, lying helplessly in the trough of the sea, with the rail under water. Sighted a vessel on the 16th; made signals of distress; she bore down to our relief, but owing to the roughness of the sea, could render no assistance; she lay by us till the 17th, when we abandoned the ship in latitude 59.30 north, longitude 7.30 west, and were taken on board the American ship *Zephyr*, of Boston, Captain Sweetzer, and landed on the 3rd of December on the north-west of St. Michael's Azores, from whence the Captain and crew made their way to Liverpool.

Lieut.-Col. F. U. Cumberland has resigned the appointment of Aide-de-Camp to the Governor General, and retires with the rank.

ON DR.—It is reported that the editorial Union which now exists between *Rochford's Daily* and the *Argus* is shortly to be followed by a union of the two papers.

Alderman Moses Piper, of Toronto, is suing the "Globe" for libel, in having charged him with being guilty of seduction.

Boring for oil is going on in Lanark County, Ont., on the banks of the river called the Mississippi, with indications of success.

I. O. O. F.—The officers of "Port la Jore Encampment" will be installed this Wednesday evening, 9th inst., at Odd Fellows' Hall.

FATAL ACCIDENTS.—On Friday last a man named Charles Dow, a lumberer, at work on the line of the New Brunswick Railway, near Woodstock Junction, was instantly killed by the fall of a brow of logs. As Mr. Daniel Campbell was driving home on the 4th, and when crossing the railway track at Aiton's crossing, two miles west of Sussex, the Quebec express from St. John came along, striking his wagon, throwing Mr. Campbell out, and killing him instantly. His body was mangled fearfully. An inquest is being held at present. The deceased gentleman was a resident of Campbell's Settlement, N. B.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.—Two boys who are in the employ of Mr. J. J. Regan, barber, appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning, to answer a charge of cruelty to animals. It appears that a dog owned by Joseph McCarey, frequents Regan's barbershop, and very often made himself obnoxious. Three times he was ejected from the shop on Tuesday evening, and on entering the fourth time, he was seized by the boys, who poured turpentine on his hind quarters, set fire to it, and set the dog baying and howling through the street. They confessed to the charge, and were each fined eight dollars.

THE Second Meeting of the Week of Prayer was held in the Wesleyan Brick Chapel, Prince Street. Rev. J. Lathern, Pastor of the Church, presided. Rev. J. M. McLeod spoke on the first subject before the meeting; Judge Young on the second. Both speeches were brief, and manifested much of the spirit of Union, and were listened to with marked attention. Revs. D. G. McDonald, K. McLennan, W. S. Pascoe, D. FitzGerald, and Mr. F. W. Moore took part in the exercise. The Choir, assisted by the congregation, sang some good old familiar Wesleyan hymns. The meeting was a pleasant and profitable one, and was well attended for such a cold night.
