BROOKVILLE ELECTIONS.

Sensational Arrests of Liberal Workers.

BROOKVILLE, April 24.—Sensation developments are the order of the day in connection with last Thursday's bye-election, and matters promise to be made exceedingly interesting for somebody. The Conservatives are determined to bring to light the wholesale corruption and fraud by which the Liberals won the contest, and they have been working quietly the past few days collecting evidence which would warrant them in taking criminal proceedings. This afternoon's move indicates that there is something in the wind. A warrant issued at the instance of J. T. Stoliker, a barber, was placed in the hands of Chief Rose, for the arrest of Antoine Wendling, proprietor of the Clifton House, charging him with giving a fraudulent ballot to one Alexander McIntosh. Wendling was arrested at his hotel and taken to police headquarters. Shortly afterwards he was arraigned before police magistrate Deacon, for the purpose of obtaining an adjournment and arranging for the matter of bail. The prisoner was admitted to bail in bonds of \$2,000, himself in \$1,000 and D. Derbyshire and D. W. Downey, in two sureties of \$500 each. The case was enlarged until Monday, May 1st. The accused is a strong Liberal and was an active worker for W. A. Comstock, the member-elect. The prosecution claim to have a very strong case.

On polling day it will be remembered a Conservative scrutineer detected Gordon Embeby attempted to pass a fraudulent ballot in a polling sub-division in the West Ward. The deputy returning officer acknowledged the initials on the back of the ballot were forged. A warrant was at once issued for Embeby's arrest, but he managed to clear out before it was executed. Last night he was returned, and this afternoon was promptly locked up. He is still in the cells at police headquarters, and will get a hearing on Monday.

Every day's developments prove more clearly that the election was won by duplicate ballots. The arrests here created a great sensation in town. The names of some prominent citizens are mentioned in connection with the distribution of these ballots, and it would not be surprising if many more arrests followed.
