Household Hints.

Chinese Cement.—Take oz. orange shellac, bruised, four ounces; highly rectified spirit of wine, three ounces. Set the mixture in a warm place, frequently shaking it till the shellac is dissolved.

To Prevent Corrosion of Metals.—Dip the articles first into a very dilute nitric acid; immerse them afterwards in luscid oil, and allow the excess of oil to drain off.

To Clean Tin and Copper.—First wash with hot water to remove grease; then rub over the ware a mixture made of powdered rotten stone, soft soap, and oil of turpentine—the mixture to be of the consistency of stiff putty. Rub off briskly with a dry, clean rag or leather. Blackened tin may be scoured bright with soap, water, and fine sand.

A slice of lemon bound round the toe troubled with the corn will help to eradicate it. Repeated from time to time. Tincture of iodine will often remove bunions. Apply with the finger-nail and morning.

Sassafras.—The bark of the root, which is the medicinal part, is alterative, diuretic, diaphoretic, and a warm aromatic stimulant. It is chiefly used to improve the flavor of other medicines, and also as a constituent of these compounds which are recommended in chronic rheumatism, eruptions of the skin, scurvy, and other affections. Dose of the fluid extract, one or two drams; infusion of tea, two ounces to a pint of water, to be drunk as desired. Having thus given you its medicinal properties and uses, you can yourself judge of its effects.

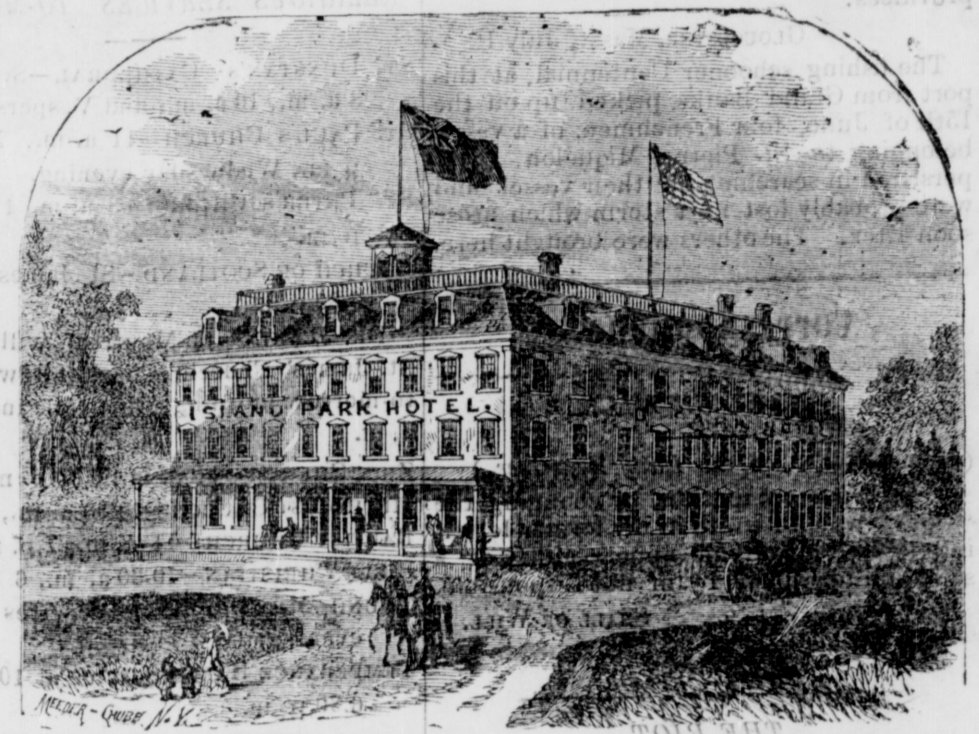
