Liability Charge Results in \$200 Fine

Magistrate James B. Johnston fined Marjorie (Mrs. George) Kerwin, North Rustico, \$200 and costs or three months when she was convicted of selling liquor to another person at her residence (not being a vendor). She appeared in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday morning.

Magistrate Johnston said he was satisfied from the evidence that the accused did sell the liquor. Although Mrs. Kerwin's attorney, Allison H. Gillis, raised the point that the evidence hadn't established that she was owner of the premises on which the offence occurred, Magistrate Johnston felt that that didn't make any difference. "I'm quite satisfied that the accused was a person suffered to be on the premises and I have to convict the accused as charged," he said.

William Murray Kennedy, Parkdale, on a charge of driving a motor vehicle on the highway while his ability was impaired by alcohol, had his case adjourned to April 13. Summing up the magistrate said there was no question that

the accused was impaired, there was the question as to whether or not he was driving. As there is no evidence on the record in the case and as "under the circumstances the explanation of the defence is not supported," Magistrate Johnston dismissed the case.

Leisher O'Donnell was counsel for the accused. Gary Laurence Baell, Mermaid, was remanded to April 1 for judgment with bail to stand on a charge of stealing 33 pecks of uncleaned, ungraded oysters and four oyster crates from the oyster storage building of John Daniel MacDonald, Glenfmann, Joseph Alexander Pineau, North Rustico, was remanded by consent to April 13 for preliminary hearing (with bail to stand) on a charge of breaking and entering the People's Co-operative Store in North Rustico and stealing \$30 cash.

Coloman A. Tawil and Lorna Mary (Mrs. Solomon Tawil) of North Rustico had their cases adjourned by consent to April 2 to fix a date for trial on similar charges of having in their possession a quantity of unlawfully manufactured spirits.

Cardigan Centennial Programs Discussed

CARDIGAN — At a meeting of the Cardigan Centennial Committee, held in the town Tuesday evening, further plans were made and reports received from committee chairmen.

The overall chairman, Noel Wilcocks, reported that a parade would be available for a parade to be held on Cardigan Day, Aug. 8. John Quinn, president of the Cardigan branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, was appointed in charge of a quantity of cards in charge of the parade, and several neighboring Legion branches have agreed to assist in this project. The construction of a foot bridge to be included in the parade will be held in the town and was decided to invite nearby communities to participate.

John S. Macdonald, chairman of the lighting and decorations, reported on the cost of pennants, and a suggestion was made that local service station operators contact their parent oil companies with regard to supplying some pennants to assist in the village decoration. It was also decided to hold a contest for the school children in which they would submit entries for a display to be used on welcoming signboards to be placed at the entrances to the village.

John S. Macdonald, chairman of the parade and band arrangements, reported that a series of four bands will be invited to the Parish Hall during the month of April, the proceeds to be used for the ways and means committee.

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
