

Festival Wins Continue By City's Bell-Tone Singers

The Bell-Tone Singers of Charlottetown, who to date have attained the highest mark in the P. E. I. Music Festival, 90 last night were awarded 89 in class 22 women's chorus, three parts, by adjudicator Lloyd Queen. They received the 90 Monday night during the official opening by Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald performing in class 22 women's chorus, three parts. Their presentation of Brahms "Lullaby" which they performed Monday night and "Kitty Magee" which they presented last night in class 22 were recorded. The recordings will be sent to Winnipeg where they along with other recordings of outstanding performances in the other various music festivals across Canada affiliated with the Canadian Federation of Music Festivals will be listened to by a panel of adjudicators. The winner of this judging will receive the Lincoln Trophy for the best performance during the festivals.

Besides these two exceptionally fine marks, the Bell-Tone Singers in class 20, choral group, mixed voices, 4 part and in class 26 men's chorus, 4 part received 86 for each performance.

The festival continues today at the Confederation Centre with sessions at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. in the theatre and rehearsal room and 7:30 this evening at the theatre only.

Saturday morning music teachers on Prince Edward Island will have the opportunity to meet with adjudicators in both Charlottetown and Summerside to discuss the teaching of music.

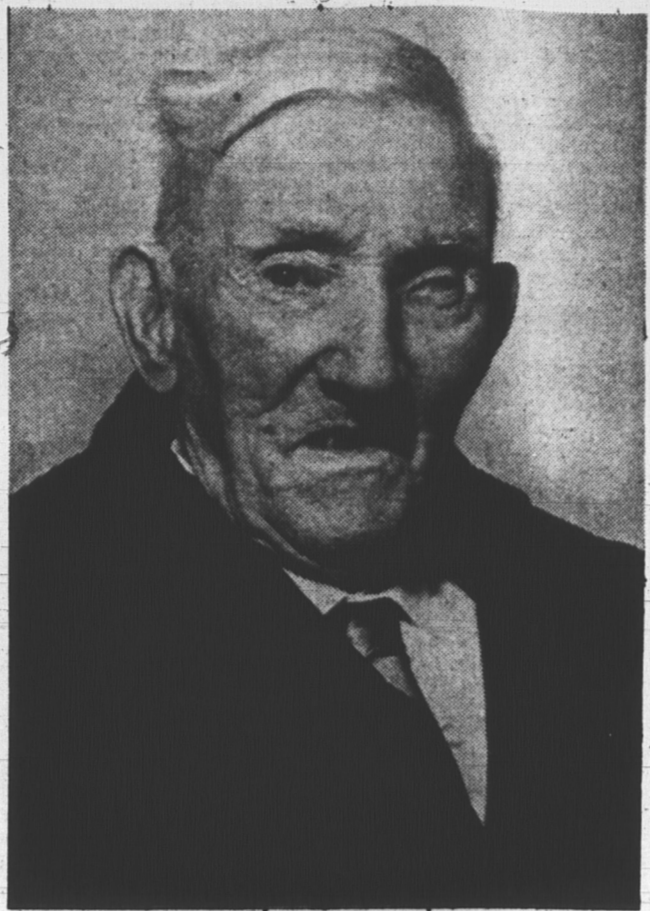

Festival At Montague Opens Classes Today

The Montague section of the 21st annual P.E.I. Competitive Music Festival begins this morning at nine o'clock at the Montague Regional Auditorium. The festival was officially opened by Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald Monday evening at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown. Festival activities began last Monday morning in both Charlottetown and Summerside.

The Montague section will be active today and Friday with sessions at 9 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. All sessions will take place in the regional auditorium.

A fifth adjudicator has been named to the list of four who have been conducting the judging duties up to date. Mrs. Marcia Loynd of Charlottetown will join Earle Terry and Lloyd Queen, two well known adjudicators who have been adjudicating since the festival began Monday. She will be adjudicating sessions Friday morning and afternoon in Montague.

Mrs. Loynd, an accomplished pianist, received her Bachelor of Music degree from Lawrence University Conservatory of Music and her Master of Music Degree from the University of Wisconsin. She was a student of Viennese concert pianist Paul Badura-Skoda. She has taught music history and literature and piano at the University of Wisconsin.

Last year she gave a successful piano recital at St. Dunstan's University. She concentrates a great deal on music of the classical period with special emphasis on Mozart and Beethoven.

She was with the Canadian Opera Company before coming to Charlottetown and toured with the Museum Children's Theatre of Toronto.

Last year she gave two sets of lectures on music at Prince of Wales College.

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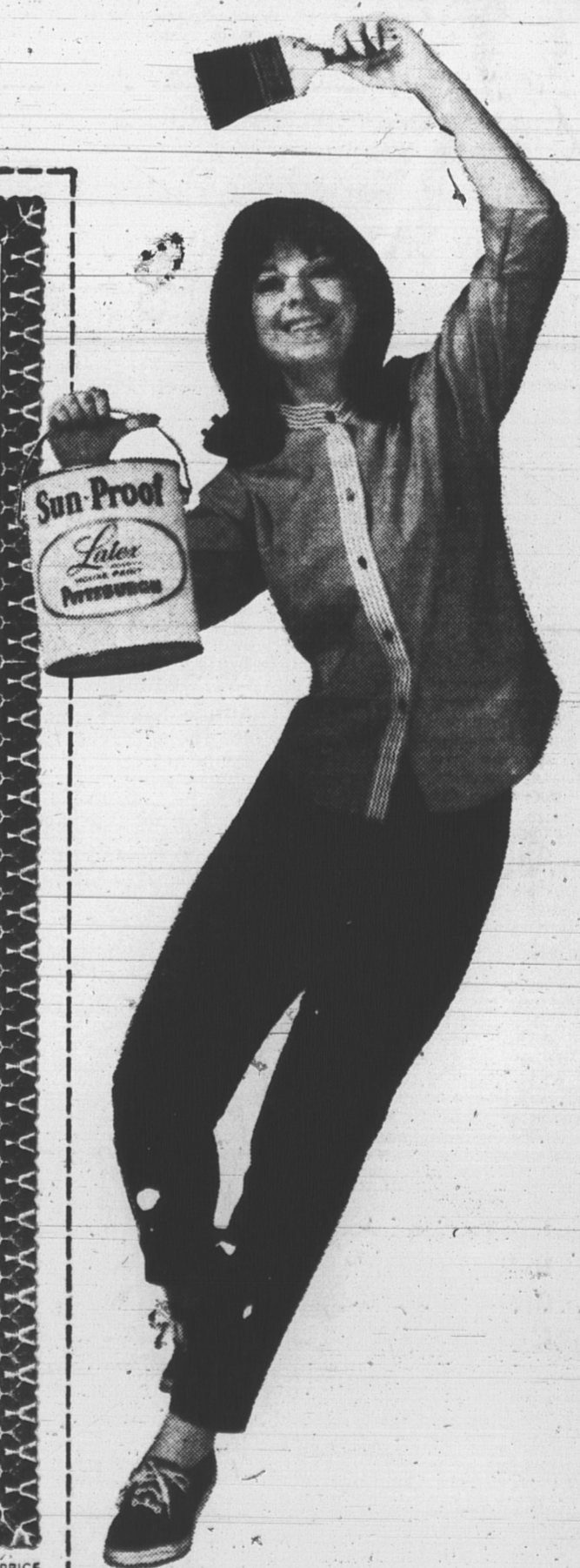
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
