17 Apply For Auxiliary Police Force

SEVENTEEN applications have been received to date by RCMP for enlistment in the proposed auxiliary police force, Inspector A.S. McNeil, officer commanding RCMP "L" division, said yesterday. The auxiliary force is designed to aid local police and RCMP in time of emergency. They would also be used extensively in work with the heavy traffic expected in 1964. Inspector McNeil said that the applications have not been completely processed as yet but this should be completed shortly. Training is expected to begin shortly under the direction of Sgt. Major T.J. Keefe, RCMP, who is also instructor with the E. Williams, RCMP. The training will be carried out at the Charlottetown RCMP barracks and in Summerside, the Inspector said.
