**Local and Other Items.**

**NAVAL.**—H. M. S. Pallas will be replaced on the North American station by H. M. S. Prosperine. The cruiser Comus is to replace the Cordelia and H. M. S. Brisk will also come to this station.

**NEW TELEPHONE COMPANY.**—The People's Telephone Corporation of New York was incorporated at Albany last week. They will operate in New York City, towns and villages in New York State and the Dominion of Canada. The capital is \$5,000,000.

**OUT OF SEASON.**—W A Hayward, Jr, while driving in from Rockland on Monday morning, espied a bunch of luscious strawberries by the roadside. On one stock were ripe berries, green fruit, blossoms and buds. It is said strawberries in October indicate a mild open winter.—Hartland Advertiser.

**SONS OF TEMPERANCE.**—Fifty years ago next Sunday, the 23rd inst, the Sons of Temperance of P. E. Island were organized into the Grand Division. Owing to the jubilee day being Sunday, on Tuesday, 25th, the jubilee celebration will take place consisting of a fraternal meeting in Charlottetown, in the afternoon and a public meeting in Grace Church in the evening at which officers of the National Division and prominent members of the Grand Division will speak. The usual half fare railway privileges will be arranged, good from Saturday the 22nd to Thursday the 29th, both, the annual meeting at Fredericton and the jubilee meeting at Charlottetown.

**COAL IN NEWFOUNDLAND.**—Writing in the London Times, D W Prowse thus describes the coal of Newfoundland. The coal is bright, clean and hard. It very much resembles in appearance the variety of the mineral known in England as Wharfedale Silkstone coal. It has been tested on the local railway with excellent results. Coal-mining and exploration have only been carried out on a very small scale over the 50 square miles of the Grand Lake coalfields. The largest output, so far, is from the pit at the end of the branch railway. Since the line was completed, operations have commenced on a coal seam which has been opened right on the main line, near a small river, called Goose Brook. This coal is of excellent quality, and there is every indication that the coal measure and workable areas of coal extend much further than was at first supposed. Recent exploration and actual working show clearly that the whole of the western portion of the island, the most beautiful and productive portion of the colony, is more or less a vast coalfield.—The north-east portion of carboniferous area, as it is now being traced out, pushes into the interior, and not towards the gulf. There are three coal areas in Newfoundland—Grand Lake, St. George Bay and Codroy. It is probable that in the near future the best seam, the Codroy coal, will be worked.

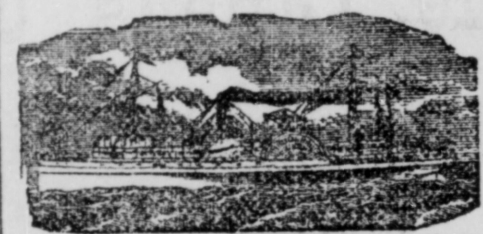

**NEW HORSE STANDARD.**

What is Necessary to Make a Horse Standard-bred.

On November 1st next the new rules, as to the qualification of or what constitutes a standard bred horse, will go into operation. We herewith give them, so all interested had better cut them from this paper and preserve them for future reference:—

**THE NEW STANDARD.**

1—The progeny of a registered standard trotting horse and a registered standard trotting mare.

2—A stallion sired by a registered standard trotting horse, and whose dam and grandam were sired by registered standard trotting horses and he himself had a trotting record of 2.30 and is the sire of three trotters with records of 2.30 from different mares.

3—A mare whose sire is a registered standard trotting horse, and whose dam and grandam were sired by registered standard trotting horses, provided she herself has a trotting record of 2.30 or is the dam of one trotter with a record of 2.30

4—Any mare sired by a registered standard trotting horse provided she is the dam of two trotters with records of 2.30 by different sires.

5—A mare sired by a registered standard trotting horse, provided his first, second and third dams are by a registered standard trotting horse.

The rules for pacers are identical with those for trotters, except that the time standard is 2.25. There is also an additional rule governing horses of so-called mixed breeding. It is:

6—The progeny of a registered standard trotting horse out of a registered standard pacing mare; or the progeny of a registered standard pacing horse, out of a registered standard trotting mare shall be eligible to be registered as a standard pacer.
