Many Island hockey followers got the surprise of their life here on Tuesday night when an aggressive band of Glac Bay Miners hockeyists skated to a 4-2 victory over the Big Four league leaders, Charlottetown Islanders, in an exhibition hockey tilt at the Forum. The Miners performance was certainly an eye-opener to most fans here who were expecting the Islanders to take a victory over the second-place Cape Breton League representatives without much difficulty.

It was a natural conclusion for many fans to arrive at when one looks at the facts. With the Sydney Millionaires playing heads and shoulders over the other two entries in that league, Miners and North Sydney, through most of their schedule to date in the Cape Breton circuit, and at the same time Sydney having such a close five game series with Islanders (with the exception of their last meeting) it was logical enough for fans here to suppose that the Miners would be an inferior team to the Islanders.

Such supposition didn't prove true, however. Opening up right from the start of the game, Miners proved themselves to be an aggressive, fast, rugged team that has plenty of smart hockey savvy and the men to carry it out. Their passing plays were really hot at times and they never stopped boring in. Cooping the Islanders up behind their own blue line in the first period, Glac Bay displayed effective power plays that paid off with goals on two different occasions while holding the Islanders scoreless.

After weathering a powerful rally by Islanders in the early part of the second session, with smart defensive tactics, Miners shot the locals one for one in the frame and were again showing as the aggressors in the closing half of the frame. Islanders repeated the performance again in the opening half of the final session that nettled them their second goal, but once again the Miners proved more than equal to the task. Striking back hard in the last ten minutes of play, Islanders hardly got out past the red line at centre ice only having to handle one shot during that time, while the Glac Bay crew peppered six shots at Gordon and beat him cleanly on another.

In the first and third periods in particular, the young Islanders in particular, Hal Gordon, had one of his busiest nights of the season and came up with some stellar net tending during hectic moments that saved Islanders' bacon on a number of occasions. Woodall in the Glac Bay cage also proved himself to be a top calibre goal tender. A big boy for a goalie, Woodall handled most of his shots with ease and assurance, and when the necessity arose to move fast, he really covered space in a hurry. Many of his shots, however, were hurried, hampered ones due to close defensive work on the part of the Miners defence and forward departments.

Admittedly the Islanders didn't come up with the top calibre of hockey that they have been turning in all season, which probably showed Glac Bay to advantage, but many fans here are rating the Miners as a real contender against the Cape Breton circuit; a thing that here-to-fore, wasn't even considered by most who have been judging them on the reports of their showings this season in the Cape Breton league.

However, that is a matter of opinion, and will have to be proven first. But it is not a mere matter of opinion that the Islanders showings of late are a clear indication that they are definitely in need of a good rest. It was written all over them in Tuesday night's contest against Glac Bay. They are just plain leg weary from all appearances, but of course it is little wonder. The boys have been hitting a terrific clip all season, and in the last nine days alone, have played six closely contested matches.

With the added travel to meet Mainland commitments, it has been a continual strain and drain on their resources, and it is be-

It is expected that he may be recalled to the parent club before long. McCormack left to join the Hornets at Buffalo where he is to play tonight.

His marriage to Margaret Ann Gordon, a nurse, came as a surprise. Friends knew it was in the offing but thought the date would be after the hockey season ended.

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
