PHEASANT POSSIBILITIES - Although sportsmen here are not as concerned with the hunting of pheasants as they were a few years back, the possibilities of this game bird are shown by the results of the big annual shoot on Pelee Island, Ont. TRIAL PROCEEDING - The final witnesses were heard yesterday in the trial of Elmer Wilfred Feehan, Point de Roche, accused of rape, in the Supreme Court before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell. The Crown closed its presentation of evidence with witnesses C. W. MacArthur, Chief of Police, Sgt. Starns, Webster and Cnst. Lloyd Wakeelin, both of the City Police Force, and the girl who was allegedly attacked. The court room was cleared of spectators during the giving of her evidence. Only witnesses for the defense were the accused and Edward Francis McDonald (Fall) who is also accused of rape. This morning the opposing counsel will sum up their evidence and address the jury prior to the charge being given by the presiding justice. Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, K. C. and Mr. John Nicholson are appearing for the Crown while Mr. J. A. McDonald, K.C., represents the defendant.

Maritimes To Have Own Active Force Band

The four Atlantic Provinces may soon have their own Active Force military band if recruiting lives up to expectations. Additional inducements are being offered to qualified musicians to "go active" and in future every bandman can be at least a sergeant if he has experience and ability with many opportunities to become staff sergeants and warrant officers.

To be known as the Royal Canadian Artillery Band (Coast), the 35 musicians will be stationed in Halifax but will be employed throughout Eastern Command as the occasion warrants, it was announced by headquarters. Under the new policy men will be enlisted with the rank of sergeant if they can qualify as any experienced musician should. In the main the test consists of ability to play all scales and standard concert works at sight.

Canada now has seven permanent force bands and musicians are posted to the group of their choice as far as possible. For the Maritime band, local applicants will be posted here with some experienced men being brought in. Physical qualifications are low with age limits set at 17-45. Married men may enlist with the pay scale ranging from \$261 monthly up to \$355. For single men the rate is about \$30 per month less.

Director of the band is Lieut. E. R. Wragg, formerly an assistant director of music at Keeler Hall, England, the famous British band school. In the permanent British Army since 1924, Lieut. Wragg is a graduate of the Royal Military School of Music and the Royal College of Music and transferred to the Canadian Army this summer. Applicants should apply either to Lieut. Wragg at Eastern Command, Halifax or to the Director of Army Personnel at Army Headquarters, Ottawa.

Optimistic Re Maritime Trade

HALIFAX, Jan. 14 - "There is good reason for optimism insofar as Maritime trade is concerned," W. A. Kember, Montreal, assistant general freight traffic manager, Canadian National Railways, told newsmen here today. "Unless something unforeseen happens the business outlook for the Atlantic Provinces is brighter than for some years."

To prove his point, Mr. Kember reported figures for freight originating in the Atlantic region in 1951 which showed an approximately 17 per cent increase over tonnages hauled by the C. N. R. in the previous year. Indications were that this upward trend would continue in 1952.

Among the principal commodities showing substantial increases in the past year, said Mr. Kember, were pulpwood and other lumber products, steel and manufactured goods, dairy products, salt and other minerals, brick and other building materials, coal and coke. The increased traffic totaled approximately 1,300,000 tons.

Mr. Kember is making an inspection tour of the Maritimes accompanied by E. B. Robb, general freight agent, Atlantic Region, Moncton. He has visited Saint John and Charlottetown and after meeting local business, port and railway officials here will go to Sydney on Wednesday. While in Nova Scotia Mr. Kember will also be accompanied by A. A. Leaman, division freight agent, here.

Island Prize Winners At Royal Fair Receive \$892

A complete list of Island prize winners at the recent Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, with a comparison of the total prize money compared to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick has been received from Premier J. Walter Jones. It shows that exhibitors from here took home a total of \$892, with Nova Scotians winning \$617.25 and New Brunswickers taking \$499.92.

Nova Scotia took its biggest single amount in the dairy cattle class, while New Brunswick won the most of its money in the beef cattle. However, Premier Jones pointed out that the showing of these animals involved considerable expense to the exhibitor.

Among the Island exhibitors Athol Roberts, Southport, won \$15 in the beef cattle, but the greatest number of exhibitors showed swine, Col. F. I. Andrew, Charlottetown, won two seconds and a third for a total of \$60. Chesse! Annear, Montague, had two money winners for \$39. Harvey Douglas, Head of Hillsborough, had a second placing for \$15. William Found New London, had six money winners for a total of \$58. Leigh Prizzell, Marshfield, had a second place for \$15. Wilfred Furness, Vernon, won \$10.

The biggest winner was Harrison Green, Kingston, who had seven money winning animals, including two first placings, for a total of \$90. Allison Harper, Carleton, won \$15, and John Johnson and Sons, Kensington, had two first places for \$50. William Lund, Tracadie, had a second place for \$15. Ralph MacLeod, Murray River, won \$14. Keith MacLeod, Kensington, \$15 and Frank McAulay and Sons, Souris, the same amount. Fred Matheson, St. Peter's Bay, had a third place worth \$5, while the same placing brought James Nundy, Charlottetown, \$10. Elmer Peters, Rollo Bay, had a first and a second for \$40, while Willard Proud, Kingston, had two seconds and a seventh for \$50.

William Ramsay, Malpeque, won \$3 for a third place, as did John Somers and Messrs. George Stirling Willie, North River, had two firsts, a second and a fourth which brought him \$81. David Wright, Montague, had two firsts, a second and the Reserve Champion. He won \$80. Ralph Younker, New Wiltshire, won \$5 for a third place.

Almon Boswell, Dunstaffnage, had a third and fourth placing in the turkeys, geese and ducks class and won \$7. The big prize winner was D. MacLeod, Vernon, who won the championship in the dressed pig and poultry. He received \$50 for this as well as winning another \$24 for a first place and a fourth place in the class.

In the vegetable division Gerard MacDonald, won \$2 for a fifth place, and Eldon Wright, Kinkora, won \$5 for a sixth place. There were five Islanders in the winners circle in the seed class, R. L. Burge, St. Peter's, won \$14 for a fourth place and Alexander Robertson, East Baltic, took home \$18 for a second place. Other winners in this classification included C. W. Ramsay, Miscouche, \$8; Charles Reid, Charlottetown, \$5; and Elliott Wright, Middleton, \$4.

Good progress was reported by officials of the Island Telephone Company last night in the repairing of the breaks in the Montague line caused by the severe storm on Friday last, and a few local lines which are still out.

In one section 22 poles were reported to be down on the Montague line and while temporary repairs were effected over the week-end, the replacement of the poles and the stringing of permanent wire was said to be well in hand. Other utility services were reported to be operating satisfactorily, although freezing rain which began to fall last evening was causing some concern. Roads in particular were very slippery and officials of the Department of Public Works said that trucks were ready to start sanding the worst sections. All main roads were open and travelling good prior to the rain, but some side roads were still blocked by the heavy fall of snow. The weather forecast late last night from the Radio Range was for milder temperatures and rain through the night.
