Easter Services.

The solemnities of the church were very fully and elaborately carried out in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on yesterday, the Feast of the Resurrection. At the early Masses fully four hundred and fifty persons received Holy Communion. At 10 o'clock a solemn Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, assisted by the Revs. J. C. McMillan, D. D., as Arch-Priest, J. Morris and P. J. Hagan Deacons of Honor, J. P. McGrath and P. O. Gauthier Deacons of Mass, and F. Murphy Master of Ceremonies. The Rev. D. B. Reid preached a sermon appropriate to the occasion, in which he showed that the Resurrection of Christ from the dead was not only a proof of His Divinity, the foundation of His truth and the establishment of His religion, but it was, moreover, the pledge and medal of the glorious resurrection that awaits every man who dies in the love and grace of God.
In the evening at 7 o'clock there was Pontifical Vespers, followed by the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The music during the morning and evening services was probably the finest ever heard in this city. The cathedral choir, aided by a good orchestra, more than sustained its high reputation. Mr. Blanchard presided at the organ. The Kyrie and Gloria from Mozart's 1st Mass were rendered with charming effect. Weber's Credo, with Et Inscruptus Etwas slightly fully executed, the orchestra blending with the voices in such perfect harmony as to astonish while it pleased. Millard's Sanctus, and Weber's Agnus Dei followed, and were thoroughly in keeping with the preceding.
In the evening at Benediction the music was of the highest order. Ziegler's Benedictus, Puer Tamborinis egus, Cori, and Millard's Tantum Ergo were the principal pieces rendered.
On the whole the choir is to be congratulated on their success. Mr. Blanchard deserves the praise of the community for his untiring efforts to promote good singing in the cathedral, and on this occasion the success that crowns his efforts proves at once his refined taste and unquestionable ability.
In St. Peter's Cathedral the Feast of the Resurrection was observed in the usual manner: There were three celebrations of the Holy Eucharist, at 7:15, 8 and 11 a. m., the last being choral with the Rev. T. H. Hunt as celebrant. The music used on this service was very beautiful, being that composed by the very efficient organist, Mr. L. W. Watson. At 7 p. m. Evensong was rendered by Rev. T. H. Hunt. After the sermon the choir formed in procession preceded by the cross bearer, and returning to the sanctuary a Solemn Te Deum (set to new music) was sung before the Altar. After which the Priest Incumbent, Rev. J. Simpson, being vested in a white silk cope, pronounced the benediction. The attendance at all the services was very large, and able and appropriate sermons were delivered by the Priest Incumbent.
In St. Paul's Church the services were very impressive and well attended, the Rev. W. Hamlyn preaching able and appropriate sermons morning and evening. The Holy Communion was celebrated at 8:30 and at mid-day, the number of communicants being large. Special Easter music of a high order was rendered at the morning and evening services, with beautiful solos by Mr. Jav. Davison.
In the First and Second Methodist churches the services were of an especially interesting character, and the singing was excellent. At the evening service in the First church the right hand of fellowship was extended to about forty-five new members, and about thirty new members were received into the Second church.
The music in St. James' church was also excellent, Mr. Bell presiding at the organ. In Z on church and the Baptist church the music was also especially good. Eighteen new members were received into the Baptist church.

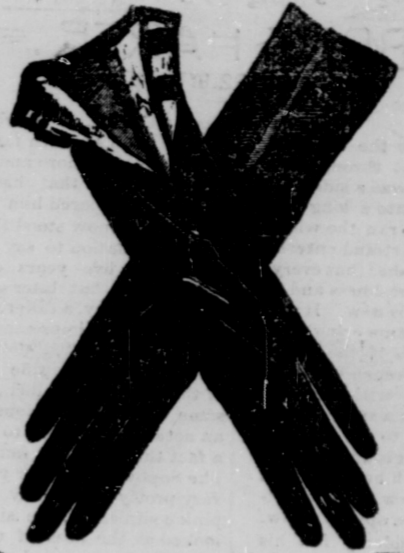

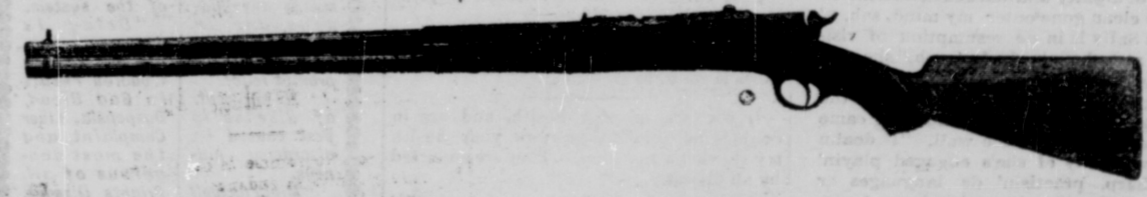
