On Thursday of this week... yesterday in fact... I received a letter from B.C. self addressed and stamped. It read as follows: B.C. Research Forest, R.R. 2, Haney, B.C.

Dear Sir: I read an article in Time Magazine Dec. 24, 1965 about your ability to rid a place of skunks. We live at this Forest Research Camp and are plagued by this odiferous animal. At present they are sojourning under the cook house... we know how to kill them but the question is how to get rid of the carcasses as we cannot leave them under there. Time Magazine covers a lot of territory. There was a time when I picked up a lot of pocket money and had no lingering scent memories to haunt me for days and weeks. Just in case someone else may be in difficulties with skunks I'll pass along the strategy employed. I used what is known to old time trappers as a "Figure 4 trap". I built a box top with boards about six inches deep and about 15 or 16 inches square. I made a hole in the top four or five inches in diameter and covered it with wire mesh. I then hinged this cover onto a platform made of half inch boards and slightly larger than the cover and hing-

**Slugging Great Williams Voted Into Hall Of Fame**

BOSTON (AP)—Ted Williams, one of baseball's all-time hitting greats, welcomed election to the Hall of Fame Thursday with the enthusiasm of a kid hitting a grand slam homer.

"This is a wonderful day for me," the former Boston Red Sox slugger said. "I can't think of anything a ballplayer would want more."

Williams was on hand at Fenway Park, home of some of his greatest triumphs, as his election was announced by Hy Hurwitz, secretary-treasurer of

the Baseball Writers Association of America.

He listened intently as he was named a landslide winner with 282 votes, an all-time high.

Williams was left off only 20 ballots, polling 93.3 per cent of the total vote. Only Ty Cobb registered a higher percentage of eligible votes, being named on 222 of 226 ballots in 1936.

**RUFFING MISSES OUT**

Red Ruffing, who won 273 games in 22 seasons with the Red Sox, New York Yankees and the Chicago White Sox, suffered a second straight disap-

pointment: Ruffing, runner-up to Luke Appling in a runoff election in 1964, received 208 votes, 18 short of the 75 per cent required.

Roy Campanella was third with 197 votes, followed by Joe Medwick with 187, Lou Boudreau with 115, Al Lopez with 109 and Enos Slaughter with 100.

Williams, 47, compiled a lifetime average of .344 in 19 seasons with the American League Red Sox. Despite several disabling injuries and two hitches as a Marine flyer in the Second World War and the Korean War,


he hit 521 homers, placing him third behind Babe Ruth and Jimmy Fox, 534. He also hit .406 in 1941—the only time the 400 mark has been reached in the last 35 years. Despite a .316 average and 29 homers, plus a \$125,000-a-year salary, Williams retired at the age of 42 after the 1960 season.






