

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

HANDBOOK REMEMBERED.—The 8th Edition on Christmas Day at St. Mary's for the Archbishop and clergy was \$1.97.—Halifax Herald. FROM ST. PETER'S ISLAND.—The Messrs Taylor came to Charlottetown from St. Peter's Island today in their sailboat. There is no ice. GOVERNMENT POND.—There has been good skating on Government Pond for several days past, and the attendance of skaters has been large. ONLY 10 CENTS.—The Y. M. C. A. social to-morrow evening, New Year's eve. An excellent programme has been prepared and a splendid time may be expected. IN THE CHURCHES YESTERDAY.

The congregations in the Upper Methodist Church were large at both services yesterday, and the sermons and singing were of a character consistent with the last Sabbath in 1895. The pastor, the Rev. W. J. Kirby, preached at both services, founding his remarks in the morning on James, iv., 14, "What is your life?" and in the evening on Psalm 90, 1st 9, "We spend our years as a tale that is told." There was a full choir, and the solos and duets were well taken. "Wonderful Words of Love," "O, Be Joyful in the Lord," and "Wake the Song of Jubilee" were all excellent. The evening sermon dealt with life as a tale, and divided into chapters as follows: (1) Chapter of infancy, the age of responsibility, wherever that might be. This chapter is mostly written by others. Mother has the most to do with this part of your lives, and the future gets much of its coloring from the influence of the home. (2) Chapter of youth. Writing for ourselves. We now take up the pen and write much of our own life's history. It is true we get a good bit of the filling in from surrounding influences; but we are responsible to place on record during this chapter of life only what will be creditable to ourselves and our surroundings. (3) Chapter of manhood. Now we begin to mix our characters in our story. This chapter brings in the wife and the husband. One on the other is the orange blossom, on the other the thorn. Many a blank is detected in this chapter, because of some secret trouble we refuse to ask others to bear with us. This chapter is smeared with tears, while the second chapter is blotted with mistakes and follies. (4) The fourth chapter, old age, and the tale almost ended. We begin to reflect over the past, and mixed up in the writing of this important chapter are many reminiscences and repentances. The body and mind are weakening and the story is observed to be drawing to a close. What shall it be? Will friends merely write the one word "Farewell," or shall the last line be, "He was not for God took him?" Be careful how you write, for while many may not see the record on earth, with Job you can say "my record is on high." (Earlier up the tide-bite; life is ended, and the tale is told. If your self's story has been of a nature you would be ashamed to hand the volume to the great judge, let us, to-night, this last Sabbath in the old year, count to the very seat, penitently praying Wash me thoroughly from mine iniquities. And cleanse me from my sins. The services in the First Methodist Church were largely attended. The dress delivered by the pastor, Rev. G. M. Campbell at the evening service was deeply practical, and is pronounced one of the most thoughtful and impressive ever delivered from this pulpit. The text was from Revelations, 20-12, "And another book was opened, which is the book of life, and the dead were judged out of the things which were written in the books, according to their works." The Christmas music, under the direction of Mr. Earle, was, as expected, very beautiful. "Behold I bring you good tidings" and "The Christmas Stars" showed conscientious work on the part of the choir, and were rendered with great taste and feeling. Rev. Mr. Sutherland preached last sermon at both services in Zion Church yesterday. His discourse in the evening was from the text "God requires of us that which is best." The discourse was appropriate to the last Sabbath of the closing year, and was very impressive. The services were well attended.
