NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

CANADA'S JUBILEE CONTINGENT.

Parliament Marking Time Till the Budget
is Delivered.

OTTAWA, April 14.—"The government
will take care that Canada is properly
represented and that the representatives
will include contingents from all the
branches of the service, not forgetting the
Northwest mounted police,"—was the
answer of Sir Richard Cartwright to a
question as to the intention of the govern-
ment respecting a military regiment for
England. Further information will be
given soon.

The Franchise Bill was further discus-
sed yesterday afternoon, after which the
House adjourned.

NOVA SCOTIA ELECTIONS.

Two Liberals Elected by Acclamation.

HALIFAX, April 14.—Yesterday was a
nomination day for the elections for the
local legislature. In Shelburne two Liber-
als were elected by acclamation. In all
the other counties there are contests.

HALIFAX, April 14.—A French Can-
adian crew has arrived here to take charge
