### TODAY'S TREAT

#### SUMMER-TIME SALAD

1 package lemon jelly powder or gelatine  
1 cup boiling water  
2 tablespoons vinegar  
1 cup oilless salad dressing  
¼ cup finely grated carrot  
¼ cup finely grated cabbage  
1½ teaspoon minced onion  
2 cups evaporated milk (chilled)  
Method: Put jelly powder or gelatine into mixing bowl, add water and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Stir in vinegar and chill. Then add salad dressing and beat with strong beater until well-blended. Fold in the vegetables. Whip the chilled milk until stiff and fold into gelatine mixture. Pour into an 8 inch dish or into individual moulds. Chill until set. When ready for use unmold and garnish.

#### HOMEMADE ICECREAM

2-3 eggs  
3 cups cream  
3 cups milk  
1 heaping cup sugar  
¼ teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon flour  
Flavouring  
Method: Mix all together and cook in double boiler for 15 minutes. Cool before freezing. This makes 3 quarts.

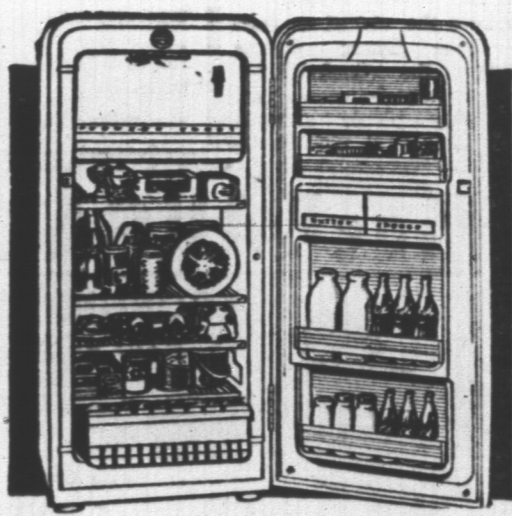
