

Caps Come From Behind To Defeat Hawks 3-2

MONCTON (CP) — Fredericton Capitals, down one goal after two periods, charged back with two markers in the third period to defeat Moncton Hawks 3-2 here Wednesday night and moved into sole possession of second place in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League.

The win gave the Capitals a two-point edge over Moncton and Amherst Ramblers in the standings. Charlottetown Islanders lead the league with 32 points, four more than Fredericton.

Yvan Houle and newcomer Todd Champagne shot the Hawks into a 2-0 lead with first-period tallies. Defenseman Jackie Heon of the Capitals then whittled the lead to 1-1 in the second frame while the Hawks were two men short.

Gerry Smith tied it 2-2 half-way through the last session and Doug McPhee put it on ice five minutes later.

Well, the writer thought that he had exhausted himself concerning the recent fines and suspensions to the Islanders in Tuesday's column. However, the incident gains so much more attention with each sunrise that he still finds it the main topic in the local sports centre with many enthusiasts getting slightly warm under the collar in regard to the now, temporarily lifted Palladino imposition.

Most Island fans are solidly of the opinion that the fine, and suspension are both ridiculous in their amount, considering that there were no injurious results and that players in this league are not in a salary class comparable with that of the professional circuits. Due to lack of information released as to what actually happened during the donnybrook in Fredericton a week ago, it is quite impossible to say what the penalty should be. If, however, the incident was what some, who profess to know, claim it was, referee Sonny MacDonald was quite justified in awarding this "long dead" penalty for such an infraction and if it is kept in practice there will be far fewer disgraceful incidents between referees and players, at least in this league.

If what some people say is true, the eight-game suspension and the \$200 fine to Palladino were not awarded solely because of the melee in York Arena Thursday night, but rather for a number of similar infractions which were reported during the season and with Vip being accused of them presumably only one of them. This school of thought makes the fine and suspension all the more ridiculous, but it and many other peculiar things are borne out in the following statement by MAHA president, Jack MacDougall of Amherst.

Mr. MacDougall's statement: "I am quite familiar with the circumstances leading up to the recent fines and suspensions imposed by the officials of the Atlantic Coast League, and my only complaint is the suspensions are far too lenient. The day of hoodlumism in hockey is over in the Maritimes. Players whose hockey ability is limited to brow-beating officials and deliberate attempts to injure their opponents must be barred from further competition in organized hockey. Referees who fail to report gross infractions must also be barred from further officiating. League officials responsible for the strict enforcement of the hockey rules as laid down by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association must insist that referees carry out the rules as written, and to give the referees the assurance that they have the full support of the league officials. There is a feeling in certain quarters that we must have a donnybrook in every game in order to attract crowds. But I assure you this is far from the truth, in that the number of people who enjoy these brawls are few in number, and in most

cases the mentality of this minority is not far from moronism. I can assure the league officials that they will receive the full support of the officers of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association in the discharge of their duties, even to the extent of imposing penalties which are not covered in our constitution, which are considered necessary for the promotion of clean hockey with their leagues."

The writer's opinion is that if the MAHA president were to voice his opinion, that the time to do so would be after the appeal board hearing is over, in the event that his statements might be just the reverse of the outcome of the final impositions, it is think that players who make deliberate attempts to injure their opponents should be barred from organized hockey, why then has this not been dealt with by league officials? Fine in the local Forum have seen two very disgraceful exhibitions of this sort already this year. In one instance Vip Palladino had his nose broken in three places off the stick of a Fredericton forward and there wasn't even a penalty awarded on the infraction. Last Friday night Wally Kullman was staggered when smashed on top of the head by the stick of Capitals' Bill McDonagh and the offender received only a major.

Again, the writer has seen all four teams in the ACSHL perform and has made it his business to study the ability of the players in them. As yet, we fall to find even one whose ability is confined to acts of hoodlumism. What ever would a league such as the ACSHL, carry players of this calibre for? Mr. MacDougall states that "referees who fail to report gross infractions must also be barred from further officiating." He further states that, "League officials responsible for the strict enforcement of the hockey rules as laid down by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association must insist that referees carry out the rules as written." It is quite evident that either many such infractions have not been reported to the league or that the league has been neglectful in its consideration of the report. If the MAHA president is so informed on some subjects and because of his position should be well read on all Maritime hockey situations, why then does he not see that the laws which govern this league, as prepared by the CAHA, are exercised properly?

Perhaps it is a very ungentleman-like attitude to take, but it greatly amuses the writer to read a Hub City sports column and discover that its youthful scribe has a nervous disorder with less than half the first season of the newly formed ACSHL's schedule played. Perhaps as he indicates in his column, he is a little one-sided in his way of thinking. If so, we don't personally care to ponder on the condition of his ailment by the time the Hawks and the Islanders have played the league finals.

There isn't a doubt that a large number of hockey fans like to see a rousing scrap once in a while in the middle of a hockey game. For one thing, it shows the boys are playing for keeps, and if there is a lot of dazzling hockey sandwiched in between the punch and sweatearabbing parties, everybody, or almost everybody, leaves the rink happy about the whole thing. But no doubt if there are many who like to see one player try to chop down another with his hockey stick, or take a sock at an official.

No matter how many picturesque and highly uncomplimentary names we call the referees, we think their decisions should not bring down mayhem upon them. Whenever respect for law and order vanishes from a hockey game, it's reduced to the kind of game kids play in their backyards, and who wants to pay money to see that?

Let's have it rough and ready with the survival of the fittest, but the sticks have been best at the ends to make it easier to pro-

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ISLANDERS DANCE

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Confirms Fines On NHL Referees

NEW YORK (CP)—Carl Voss, referee-in-chief of the National Hockey League, confirmed that NHL referees are subject to fines if they are lax in their duties.

Commenting on a Canadian Press report that referees may be fined for failure to call misconduct penalties, Voss said Wednesday "I won't deny it." But he termed the matter "an internal affair, a matter of administration within our own group," and declined to discuss the matter in detail.

Voss said the league's contracts with referees provided for possible fines, although there is no specific clause regarding misconduct penalties. An official might be fined at any time for "insubordination or anything comparable to it."

He said cases of fines, actually being levied against referees are "few and far between."

John Landy Is Fifth In Race

MELBOURNE — (AP) — John Landy, world mile record holder, ran a disappointing fifth Wednesday night in a special two-mile event at Cologny, Victoria.

The race was won by former Olympian Les Perry in the national record time of 8:55.2. This bettered Landy's previous mark of 8:56.2. Dave Stephens of Melbourne finished second in 8:57.8, also breaking the record.

Landy, who finished more than 100 yards behind Perry, was tired and dispirited at the finish. He said he has lost the incentive to do well.

Scottish Soccer Loses To Hungary

GLASGOW (CP)—Scotland's international team lost a soccer match to Hungary Wednesday but gained in prestige as it battled Hungary's powerful squad on virtually even terms before dropping a 4-2 decision.

A sell-out crowd of 135,000 fans packed Hampden Park to watch the home eleven harass the Hungarians in a game that hung in the balance until the visitors scored their clinching goal in the closing seconds. The visitors had won 12 of their previous 14 international matches and have lost only once in five years.
