

Local and Other Items.

WANTED, a Boy. Apply at this Office. J. O. O. F.—Installation of Officers at St. Lawrence Lodge this evening. To-day one Scott Act case was adjourned till Wednesday. The Brethren of Victoria Lodge, A. F. & A. M. will please remember the regular meeting this evening at eight o'clock. Short summaries of temperance sermons preached yesterday, are held over till to-morrow. THE TOLL GATES OF HELL will be the subject of Mr. Spence's address to-morrow night, for men only. It looks as if the reason the Examiner has not made up his mind on the Scott Act question is because he has no mind to make up. Boats with 36 bags mails left Cape Tormentine to-day at 11.50 a. m. (standard.) Mails are expected here about 7 o'clock. Is the report of Victoria Lodge Installation in Saturday's issue, read J. R. Davison, Secretary; and Jno. W. Morrison, Treasurer. Messrs. Taylor & Gillespie are offering special inducements to those who have magazines or illustrated papers which they wish to have bound. In the case of the prosecution of Dr. Geo. A. Baynes, under Section 38 of the "Prisoners' and Jail Medical Act, 1890" for alleged insanity in his practice, and for undue advertising, decision was given to-day. The summons was dismissed with costs. PRAISEWORTHY.—A Scottish Concert, under the auspices of the Caledonia Club, will be held in the Lyceum on Tuesday evening, the 27th inst., in honor of Burns' anniversary. The programme will consist entirely of Scottish selections. The best talent is secured, and as the proceeds are intended for the poor of the city, the concert should be well attended. The Pioneer aptly remarks:—The Examiner's position in the present Scott Act campaign, which culminates on Thursday next, is that of a half-drunken man standing on the sidewalk watching the innocent gambols of his three-year-old daughter out on the street. Suddenly, the mother, looking out from an upper window, catches sight of a runaway horse, the driver being in the bottom of the sleigh drunk. She sees the danger of her first born and realizing she herself cannot reach her darling in time, shouts to her husband to take their babe out of danger. But his reply is: "Let's (sic) discuss 't' point. The opportune moment has gone by, and before his eyes, the furious team has—but no, a friendly hand, actuated by love for the race, has been reached out and the child is safe. No thanks, however, to the drunken interest of the husband. His proposal to discuss what every one has made up their mind to, only deserves disgust and contempt." PURSUANT to a requisition of a number of citizens, a special meeting of the City Council was held this forenoon to consider the propriety of raising means to provide the poor of the city with fuel. It was resolved, owing to the great scarcity of coal and consequent distress among the poor, that a meeting of the citizens be called by His Worship the Mayor to take steps to raise funds for the procuring of wood to supply the necessities of the poor; and that the Council supplement the amount thus raised by a grant from the city treasury for the same purpose. Also resolved that the City Clerk be directed to call for tenders from parties who ho contract to deliver in the city from one to two hundred cords of hardwood, and that a committee of three be appointed to wait upon Joseph Unsworth, Superintendent of Railway, to procure as low rates of freight as possible for said wood. It was further resolved that when the wood was received it be left to the several chairmen of the city to distribute the same to the deserving poor of their congregations.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

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DEATH OF A NOTED PRIEST. QUEBEC, Jan. 4.—Mgr. Labelle, Curé of St. Jerome, and Deputy Minister of Agriculture, died this morning after a short illness. Deceased, who was 57 years old, has long been known throughout the Dominion as a priest, politician and apostle of civilization, having founded seventeen parishes in the counties of Terrebonne and Ottawa. Halifax News. HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 4.—The whole of the Cape Breton railway was opened yesterday, the first regular through train arrived from Sydney at Point Tupper at 10 o'clock. The coal shipments from Cape Breton in 1890 reached 900,000 tons against 700,000 the previous year. The Sarnia from Liverpool, and the Caspian from Liverpool via St. John arrived early this morning. Rev. Dr. Howley, profect apostolic of west shore of Newfoundland, is in this city. Post Office Strikers. LONDON, Jan. 4.—Over 200 clerks employed in the Post Office Savings Bank have been suspended from duty because they disobeyed the order of the Secretary of the Bank to remain on duty two hours over the usual time. The places of the suspended clerks were promptly filled by new men. The postal clerks have decided to strike. The question is nominally to test the question of whether working after time shall be voluntary or not. Insurrection in Caroline Islands. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 4.—Late advices from the Caroline Islands state that an era of insurrection and bloodshed has set in against the natives and Spanish troops quartered in this group. The natives have armed themselves and had several sharp engagements with the Spanish. They were cut down like grass by the galling guns. They now retreated in the bushy country. The Spanish soldiers who followed them were in turn decimated by the hidden enemy. Montreal News. MONTREAL, Jan. 4th.—Enquiry into the live cattle trade opens to-morrow morning. Mr. Pinaud, Mr. Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine and Mr. St. Louis, Deputy Minister of Justice will be present and evidence is to be taken from shippers, insurance men and representatives of steam companies. A banquet will be tendered to Premier Marier before he goes to Europe to float a ten million dollar loan. Parnell and O'Brien. PARIS, Jan. 4.—O'Brien will not resume the conference with Parnell unless the proposed negotiations obtain such sanction from the leaders of the majority of the Irish party as will justify the hope of a reunion of the party. O'Brien declines to state whether any communications are passing between himself, Dillon, McCarthy and others. They promise their approval of further negotiations. Weather Probabilities.
