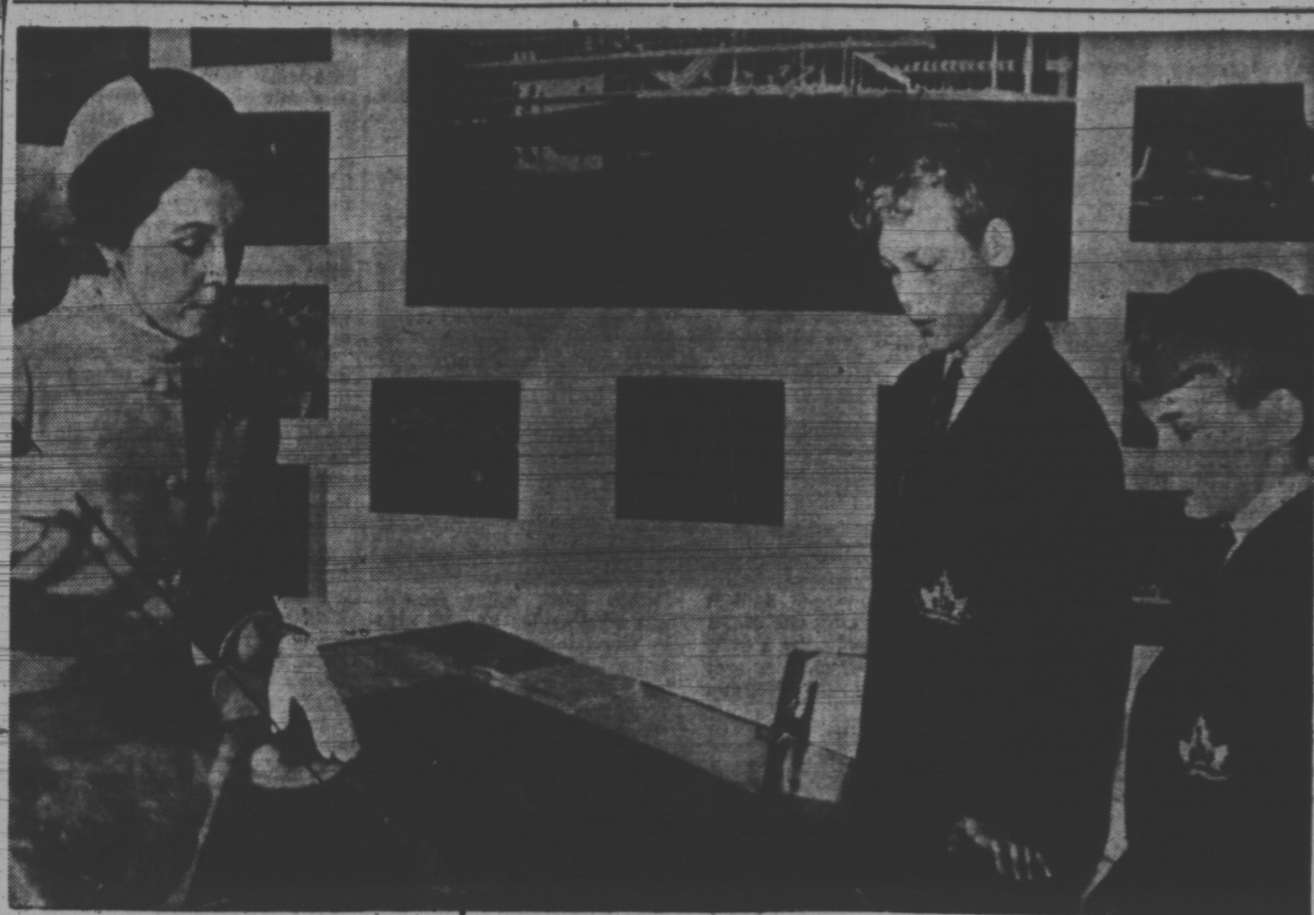

Wheat Crop Estimate Increased By Bureau

OTTAWA (CP)—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has raised the estimated size of the 1966 wheat crop to 844,841,000 bushels, a 4,000,000-bushel increase from its Oct. 5 forecast.

Both new and old estimates are Canadian production records by a wide margin. The old high of 723,000,000 bushels was set in 1963.

The federal agency indicated the crop was of high quality. It said a large proportion of it fell into the top three grades. It did not give precise grade figures.

The production totals listed in the agency's final report of the year were based on a survey made Oct. 15 when most of the grain crops were under cover except for some flaxseed.

The wheat crop is 30 per cent above last year's 648,900,000 bushels and 66 per cent above the 10-year average of 501,900,000 bushels.
The average yield—a record 27.9 bushels an acre—is 38 per cent above the 10-year average of 20.2.
The spring wheat crop, including Duram, is 828,200,000 bushels compared with the 1965 total of 635,600,000 and a 10-year average of 483,400,000.
The average wheat yield in Alberta was 29.2 bushels an acre compared to 27.7 in Saskatchewan and 24.4 in Manitoba.
Durum production almost doubled to 30,800,000 bushels from 16,900,000 last year. Manitoba had 1,300,000, Saskatchewan 24,000,000 and Alberta 3,000,000.

Educationists Said Slow To Meet Shifting Need

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—A leading Ontario educationist says provincial departments of education have been slow to meet changing needs and should share their responsibilities with those directly associated with teaching.

Dr. K. F. Prueter of the Ontario Institute of Studies in Education said here the provincial system was successful in developing "reasonably uniform standards... at a time when those who taught lacked professional competence; at a time when the future could be predicted with some degree of accuracy."

But "provincial departments of education have been slow to recognize changing needs and changing conditions," he told the Newfoundland Teachers' Association.

"Departments of education in our country do not now have, nor are they ever likely to have, all of the people necessary for competent study of curriculum matters."

"Change and the implementation of change cannot happen without involving those who teach as well as those who are taught."

He said the provincial departments of education can only discharge their responsibilities "through a program and an approach which will involve those who are directly associated with education in the province."

RECOMMENDS GROUP
Dr. Prueter, co-ordinator of curriculum projects and special services for the Ontario Institute, recommended that Newfoundland form a similar organization "independent of government, teaching profession, trustee's organizations and the university."

He explained how the Ontario Institute was formed and how it has been able to make changes in school curriculum.

He gave as an example the institute's decision to conduct studies on reading "which have been successful or which appear promising."

Once the decision was made, a committee was formed, the

were sent out to 7,000 teachers and administrators. The results were tabulated and studied and recommendations were developed.

An approach to more effective reading was developed and taught to teachers at summer school. The teachers then brought the new methods to their classrooms.

As a result development classrooms were established in primary and junior divisions, in junior high schools and in one senior high school.
