National Energy Board's Formation Expected Soon

OTTAWA (CP) — The government plans to move quickly to set up the national energy board recommended by the Borden energy commission, informants say, but they estimate it may take up to 10 months to get the new gas-and-oil regulatory body into full operation.

Thus, these sources add, there seems no doubt that the oil and gas industries, eagerly seeking more export outlets, may experience some federal delays in dealing with various issues, including decisions on new export licences. However, there still is some hope that the government may work on a temporary measure to have the cabinet set up as a ruling body on export licences until the new board is ready to function. The final decision on this move is to be given by Prime Minister Diefenbaker when he returns from his world tour just before Christmas. Officials are starting to work on legislation to be introduced at the next session of Parliament opening in January. It is understood the legislation will be designed to strengthen federal control over the industries, protect Canadian consumers against the possibility of excessive oil and gas prices and attempt to discourage excessive company profits. Informants emphasized, however, that not all of the Borden commission's recommendations are acceptable to the government. Some of its stringencies which brought strong complaints from various companies, are not likely to appear in the new legislation. For example, the board in its bulky October report emphasized that gas and oil selling prices should be fair and reasonable and this company profits also should be fair and reasonable. In particular, it criticized the prohibitors of Westcoast Transmission Company Limited and Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Limited for making huge paper profits on company stock.
