

Island Rink Has Three Wins In Schoolboy 'Spiel

SASKATOON, (CP)—Saskatchewan battled Ontario Wednesday night in a match that could be the most important of the round-robin Canadian high school curling championship.

The Prince Edward Island rink, skipped by Barry MacDonald defeated the New Brunswick rink last night in one of the major upsets of the competition, it was learned here at an early hour this morning. The score was not immediately available. The victory was the third against four losses for the Island quartet.

Earlier Saskatchewan scored its sixth straight victory to lead the 10 teams but Ontario kept right behind with another win to post a record of five wins and one loss.

Nova Scotia is third with four wins and two losses followed by Alberta and New Brunswick with three wins and three losses.

Quebec is in last place with one win in six starts.

Leafs Shut Out Red Wings 2-0

TORONTO, (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs scored twice late in the final period Wednesday night to defeat the leading Detroit Red Wings 2-0 before 13,064 National Hockey League fans.

The victory lifted the Leafs into third place in the standings over Boston Bruins, who lost 4-2 in New York.

The teams battled an even terms for 56 minutes when the Leafs struck for two quick goals, one of them a gift.

Centre Ted Sloan sent Toronto into a 1-0 lead at 16:06 when he picked up defenceman Jimmy Thomson's pass in the Detroit zone and streaked in to beat Terry Sawchuk with a sizzling waist-high shot from 20 feet out.

With 30 seconds of play left, coach Tommy Ivan waived Sawchuk from his net and sent out another forward in an attempt to tie the score. The move backfired as Leaf centre Bobby Hassard flipped a pass to defenceman Fern Flaman, who hit the empty net with a long shot.

NEW YORK, (AP)—The last-place New York Rangers were in rare form Wednesday night as they defeated Boston Bruins 4-2 at Madison Square Garden.

The win was New York's 12th of the National Hockey League season. The game was a 1-0 affair with New York ahead until the final period when the teams exploded for five goals.

Paul Ronny put New York ahead early in the second period when he took a pass from Wally Hergeshelmer in front of the Boston net and drilled one past goalie Jim Henry.

The Rangers increased their lead to two goals at 1:19 of the third period on a score by Eddie Kullman. Less than three minutes later, Harry Howell made it 3-0 when he caged a Pete Babando rebound.

The Bruins roared back to score two goals within 76 seconds. Ed Sanford took a pass from Fleming Mackell and converted a 20-footer at 7:47. At 8:13, Mackell made it 3-2 when he drove one that just made the right hand corner of the New York goal.

Babando, scheduled to report to Vancouver of the Western League Friday, tallied the clinching goal at 14:39.

Eisenhower's 'Repudiation' Explained

President Eisenhower has made it clear that when he spoke about "repudiating secret agreements" he was actually talking about expunging the United States attitude on some of them, rather than any definitive action.

Other countries, particularly Britain, which traditionally insists on respect for international commitments, looked askance when the President asked for congressional repudiation of all secret agreements which had led to the enslavement of peoples.

That would have meant expunging the diplomatic record which Russia has so flagrantly violated, and would tend to make U. S. executive agreements less valuable in the future. It would permit the Russians to claim that the Western Allies had merely considered Tehran, Yalta and Moscow agreements as temporary, so why blame Russia for repudiating them first.

It would have created the impression that the Washington administration could talk and seem to agree on all sorts of international affairs without considering anything binding until it approved by the Senate.

Eisenhower said at his first press conference as president that he by no means intended to suggest that everything agreed upon at such a time was void.

He just wants a statement from Congress that the heart of the U.S. had never agreed to the enslavement of any people.

That's purely to assure subjected peoples that the U. S. has an occasion to help them ever arises, will not be bound by the technicalities which Russia has already twisted to her own benefit.

Censorship Of Literature For Children Supported

OTTAWA, (CP)—Support for government censorship of literature intended for children was voiced Wednesday by members of a Senate committee investigating sale and distribution of indecent publications.

Senator Felix P. Quinn (PC—Nova Scotia) told a delegation from the Catholic Women's League of Canada that the league's suggestion of government censorship is the only solution to the problem of salacious publications.

Mrs. Ellen Darke of Regina, national president of the CWL, and Bishop John C. Cody, CWL director, presented a brief recommending this action:

1. A clear definition of obscenity in the Criminal Code outlining that an obscene publication is one whose dominant purpose is to promote lust.

2. Stricter enforcement of customs regulations barring import of treacherous or immoral publications.

3. A board of censors empowered to prohibit distribution and sale of obscene publications. The board should be composed of representatives of government, churches, home and school associations and teachers' groups.

4. Continuation of the special Senate committee until legislative steps are working smoothly and some improvement is evident in the type of publications available to children.

Bishop Cody said the CWL does not advocate any measures to tell adults what they may or may not read. The purpose was to protect children.
