varieties of other fruits — figs, peaches, bananas, oranges, apricots and large shipments of pineapples are made to London. No land is wasted on the island where cultivation is possible. Among the many associations in the town of Ponta Delgada there is one which aims to induce tourists to visit the Azores, especially the island of St. Michael. This society advertises largely in foreign periodicals as well as by pamphlets, views, etc. It also answers all questions pertaining to hotels, boarding houses, etc. There is another commercial association more like our own Board of Trade, only it goes a little further in some respects, and provides amusements, lectures, evening parties and again, like our own Board of Trade it appears before Parliament when matters concerning commercial or public affairs are concerned. In this town the general run of citizens dress quite fashionably, other are more quaint, and there are still a number of the peasant women dressed in their capote. The capote is a cloak of dark blue cloth and has a hood of the same material. The hood resembles a tea cozy, but is considerably larger. The back of it ends in a sweeping curve held out by whalebone. The whole dress and hood is similar to that worn by nuns, with the exception of the shape of the hood, which stands out very much over the face and makes it difficult to tell whether the wearer is good looking or otherwise. After visiting several of the public gardens where all kinds of flowers were in full bloom, we were invited into a private garden. Here the flowers were profuse, roses of the most delicate yellows to the deep pinks and reds, pineapples in great numbers. In the midst of the garden was a concrete tank about five feet wide by 20 feet in length, filled with water, where ducks were enjoying themselves swimming around.
Before taking our departure from this beautiful garden, the lady of the house presented us with a beautiful bouquet of roses and other sweetly perfumed flowers. We also carried with us a fine big pineapple picked from the same garden. There are some ancient-looking teams drawn by oxen and donkeys, and even by goats. I took a snap of a native vegetable merchant and his donkey. The vegetables are carried in two wicker baskets over the donkey's back. Of course, there are some fine horses and carriages, and autos as well.

Islander May be Next Archbishop Of Ottawa
OTTAWA, May 30.—Monsignor Albert A. Sinnott, Archbishop of Winnipeg, has been appointed Archbishop of Ottawa to succeed Archbishop Charles Hugh Gauthier, who died January 19. It was stated here last night. Officials at the Archbishop's Palace could not verify the statement last night, but said that the name of Monsignor Sinnott had been mentioned as possible choice with that of other church dignitaries. No official announcement had yet been made and no rumor heard, they stated.
Very Rev. Mgr. A. A. Sinnott was born at Morell, P. E. I., in 1877. He received his early education at the public school and at St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown. He graduated from Laval University in 1896 and studied theology at the Grand Seminary, Montreal, until 1899. He took a post graduate course at Rome in 1900 and took the D. C. L. degree in 1901. Doubt About Acceptance By Germany
PARIS, May 29.—The hope of a settlement of the reparations crisis without the necessity of action by the Allies together or by France separately, raised by the auspicious opening of the Bankers' Conference, was diminished yesterday on receipt of news from Berlin indicating that though a German cabinet crisis had been avoided the agreement was not complete on the understanding between the Finance Minister Hermes and reparations commission. The optimism of the past few days was not shared in official circles here, and the impression still prevails that the Germans do only what is necessary to prolong the negotiations. The climax will come only after the deliberations of the Reparations Commission which, in case of final default by Germany, will probably require a fortnight or longer, until just about the time of Premier Poincaré's visit to London for the Verdun commemoration.
This trip was arranged some time ago, without reference to politics, but it is regarded as unlikely that the French Premier will return from London without seeing Mr. Lloyd George and exchanging views on the situation.
Diplomatic negotiations between the Allies, whether opened in this way, or otherwise, would take several weeks so that, action, if any, probably would be deferred until some time in July.
BERLIN, May 29.—The Tangeblatt says the note to be handed to the Reparations Commission tomorrow by Germany will indicate acceptance of the Commission demands on the express conditions that an international loan to tolerable conditions.
Tomorrow's debate in the Reichstag, the Vossische Zeitung declares will be devoted almost exclusively to the Genoa Conference. It adds that Chancellor Wirth and the party leaders have decided that it would be premature to discuss publicly a solution of the Reparations questions.
The Pan German press today sharply attacks the Government's reparations policy, but says it would appear that there will be an adequate majority in its favor in the Reichstag.

Conference in Downing Street
LONDON, May 29.—A majority of those who signed the Irish peace treaty met again around the table in the Prime Minister's official residence in Downing street last night to consider the present position of the Irish toward that agreement. The British representatives were Premier Lloyd George, Austen Chamberlain, Lord Birkenhead, Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, Winston Churchill and Sir Hamar Greenwood.
The Irish representatives were Arthur Griffiths, Michael Collins, Eamon J. Duggan, Wm. T. Cosgrave, Danmuid O'Haggarty, Secretary of the Dail Eireann, and Hugh Kennedy, Irish adviser of the Provisional Government.
Only a few curious persons gathered in the street and no public interest was displayed. The conference was held at six o'clock in the evening, and lasted for an hour and a half, when it was adjourned until Monday morning.
A brief official statement was issued, which merely said that the business considered had to do with arrangements for the general election in South Ireland in June. After the meeting the Irish delegates went quickly to their hotels; they informed the reporters that it had been agreed to give no information to the press.
It appeared evident that the conference were taking no chances of any misunderstanding over the proceedings, as four stenographers were present. It is believed Mr. Churchill will make a statement in the House of Commons on Monday on the Irish situation.
The Prime Minister left last night to spend Sunday in the country.
