Truman Flies Home To Inspect Flood Damages

Canada's Armed Forces Boost Manpower Total To 81,000 Says Minister

OTTAWA, July 17 (CP) — Defence Minister Claxton said tonight Canada's armed forces have boosted their manpower to 81,000 or 70 per cent more than the 47,000 men they had when war broke out in Korea.

"Success in Korea, far from diminishing the need for strength, has shown that we must never again disarm in the face of a potential aggressor who remains fully armed," he said in a free-time CBC political broadcast. "That is why we must continue this combined effort to deter aggression by building up and keeping up our strength."

Mr. Claxton, reporting on Canada's effort in Korea, said the three destroyers there have steamed twice as far as they did during a similar period in the Second World War. Canada's units of all three services had acquitted themselves gallantly. Her expenditure of effort and money had been "tremendous."

Fire Destroys Dublin Theatre

DUBLIN, July 18 (Wednesday) — A fire that broke out suddenly in Dublin's famous Abbey Theatre early this morning destroyed the main part of the building before it was brought under control. The blaze was discovered at 1:30 a. m. and 30 minutes later the greater part of the auditorium and stage had been burned.

Full Agreement Reached On Pensions Regulations

OTTAWA, July 17 (CP) — Federal provincial representatives today concluded a two-day closed conference on regulations to govern the payment of old-age assistance at 65 and blindness allowances at 21. Health Minister Martin, chairman of the conference, said "full agreement" was reached and considerable progress made towards the common objective of uniformity in the administration of the regulations.

Arab League Assails Britain On Oil Movement

CAIRO, July 17 (Reuters) — The seven-country Arab League today assailed Britain for its insistence in trying to get cargoes of Arabian oil to the refinery at Haifa, Israel. Azzam Pasha, Secretary-General of the League, said it supported Egypt's refusal to let such cargoes go through the Suez Canal.

Canadian Ships Strikebound

MONTREAL, July 17 (CP) — Hal C. Banks, vice-president and Canadian director of the Seafarers' International Union, said today that two Canadian freighters are strikebound in Ogdensburg, N. Y. He said the ships are the Walter B. Reynolds and George L. Eaton, owned by the Hall Corporation of Montreal, and that crews have thrown picket lines about the ships.

Fellowships Presented At Institute Convention

AMHERST, N.S., July 17 (CP) — Premier J. Walter Jones of Prince Edward Island and W. W. Baird, Experimental Farm Superintendent, were presented with Fellowships at a Maritime convention of the Agricultural Institute of Canada here tonight. Mr. Baird, superintendent at Nappan, N.S., has been outstanding in agricultural work for 35 years. Premier Jones is one of Canada's leading Holstein breeders and also has extensive interest in fox breeding, potato growing and general farming.

Evidence Heard At Inquest Into Highway Fatality

The inquest on the death of Miss Paula Perry, nineteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Perry, 40 Brighton Ave., Charlottetown, was further adjourned last evening by Coroner Dr. H. P. Stewart of Eidon, until evidence could be heard from two witnesses who are at present in the Charlottetown Hospital suffering from shock.

Says U.S. Asks For Use of Spanish Air And Naval Bases

MADRID, July 17 (AP) — Admiral Forrest P. Sherman has asked Generalissimo Franco what he would want in return for United States use of Spanish air and naval bases, reliable informants reported today. The sources said the American chief of naval operations asked Franco at their two-hour meeting Monday for the right to use four naval bases and three to five air bases.

Reds Reported Posed To Strike If Talks Fail

SEOUL, July 18 (Wednesday) — (AP) — Communist and United Nations military leaders were going back to Kaesong again today to make a new effort to decide on an agenda for armistice talks aimed at ending the Korean War. The sixth session of negotiators was to open at 10 a. m. today (8 p.m. EDT Tue. day).

Assails United Nations Covenant On Human Rights

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP) — Senator John W. Bricker (Rep.-Ohio) assailed today as "a blueprint for tyranny" the proposed United Nations covenant on human rights he said had been drafted under "the immediate direction" of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Allied Patrols Lash At Reds

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, July 18 (Wednesday) — (AP) — Allied tanked patrols punched hard Tuesday at a Red buildup near the site of the Kaesong cease-fire talks. Patrols crossed the Imjin River and lashed at Chinese units at half-a-dozen spots northeast of Kaesong and north of Korangpo. The Red buildup was outside the five-mile neutral zone around Kaesong.

U.S. Envoy Admits That He Has Made Little Headway In Oil Crisis

TEHRAN, July 17 (CP) — President Truman's "trouble-shooter" admitted today he had made little headway in smoothing Iran's oil crises. At the same time, bloody riots protesting American intervention pointed up trouble within Iran's own government. W. Averell Harriman, sent by Truman to talk with Premier Mohammed Mossadegh, said Mossadegh is sticking to his plan to nationalize the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company to the hilt.

New Belgian King Crowned

BRUSSELS, Belgium, July 17 (Reuters) — Europe's youngest King climbed onto Europe's most-troubled throne today in a lavish spectacle of gaiety and color. Twenty-year-old Prince Baudouin became Baudouin I of the Belgians, filling the throne his father, Leopold III, abdicated after 17 years.

Hail Storm Ruins Crops

SASKATOON, July 17 (CP) — Crops were wiped out over a strip from two to three miles wide and 10 miles long north of Eyre late yesterday when hail stones the size of hens' eggs fell. Observers said the temperature dropped from 82 to 56 degrees within a few minutes. Damage ranged from 60 to 100 per cent and some whole fields were wiped out within 10 minutes.

Canadian Doctors Treat Americans In Korea

The cause of it all, a dime-sized shrapnel splinter, was wrapped in a gauze packet and taped onto the unconscious American soldier's shoulder by a theatre assistant, Pte. Patrick O'Connor of Montreal. The wounded G.I. had asked that it be kept for him. He wanted to see what had caused the neat hole just to the left of his left knee-cap and had sent the upper limb into a swell like a baby blimp.
