## International Scout Hdq. To Move—London To Ottawa

CAMBRIDGE, Eng. (Reuters)—Delegates at the 16th international scout conference here decided unanimously Thursday to move the headquarters of the international scout bureau from London to Ottawa.

The move is part of a long-term plan, a feature of which is to provide more travelling commissioners for the Far East, the Middle East, Latin America and Europe and later Africa.

Delegates from 67 countries attended the conference.

The bureau acts as co-ordinator among the national associations in more than 130 countries.

## THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

**CAN TEST TRUE LOVE OF GOD**

One day a lawyer, in the gospel, asked Our Blessed Lord a question which is of vital interest to all of us. "Lord, what must I do to possess eternal life?" Christ asked him what was written in the law and the lawyer answered, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind, and thy neighbor as thyself." Christ said to him, "Thou hast answered right; do this and thou shalt live.

These are the two great commandments of love. In them is contained the whole law and hence everything we must do to attain eternal life. St. Paul tells us the necessity and importance of having charity when he writes in his letter to the Corinthians, "If I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. . . . And if I should distribute all my goods to feed the poor, and if I should deliver my body to be burned and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing."

Yes, charity is the greatest of the virtues for we are told, "There are faith, hope and charity these three, but the greatest of these is charity."

We must love God and our neighbor, otherwise all our other good deeds will be done in vain. This may lead us to wonder if there is any way that we can tell if we are loving God as we ought — is there a test we can use here below which will indicate the depth of our love of God?

**MEASURE OF LOVE**

St. John, the disciple whom Jesus loved, helps us answer this when he says, "If any man says he loves God and hateth his brother, he is a liar. For he that loveth not his brother whom he seeth how can he love God, whom he seeth not?" The love we have for our neighbor is the measure of our love of God. It is the test we may use to determine the progress we are making to gain eternal life.

Christ Himself made the love of neighbor the distinguishing mark of the Christian: "By this shall all men know that you are my disciples, that you have love one for another."

By means of the parable of the good Samaritan, Christ points out to us who our neighbor is. Our neighbor is not only a friend, a relative, a fellow-parishioner, a fellow-countryman; rather he is a man without distinction, without exception. He is anyone who has need of our help and to whom we can be of assistance. We must love all men for God, and love God in them.

**SERMON ON MOUNT**

In His Sermon on the Mount, Christ showed us the great importance that he attached to love of neighbor: "If therefore, thou art offering thy gift at the altar and there thou rememberest that thy brother hath anything against thee, leave there thy gift before the altar and go first to be reconciled to thy brother; and then coming, thou shalt offer thy gift."

Christ wishes us to be reconciled with our neighbor even if this meant interrupting a sacrifice, the highest act of religious worship. The full significance of this command of Christ may be lost to us until we realize that among the Jews and Gentiles of Christ's time, it was unheard of to break off a sacrifice once it had been begun.

It is good for us, from time to time, to examine ourselves on our love of neighbor to determine how well we really love God. St. Paul has pointed out the characteristics our charity must have: we should review these often for we shall profit by them greatly.

"Charity is patient, is kind; charity envieth not, dealeth not perversely; is not puffed up; is not ambitious; seeketh not her own; is not provoked in anger; thinketh no evil; rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth with the truth; beareth all things believeth all things, hopeth all things, and endureth all things."

Group Capt. James B. Millward, DFC, 46, of Sherbrooke, Que., now assistant air attaché at the Canadian joint staff, Washington, has been appointed RCAF member of the directing staff at the National Defence College, Kingston.

He has been succeeded at Washington by Group Capt. Cecil W. Chapman, DSO, 39, of Fredericton, commander of the RCAF station at Greenwood, N.S., for the last four years.

## Gallery Will Rent Pictures

HAMILTON (CP)—The new Hamilton Art Gallery, built on the Royal Botanical Gardens property near McMaster University, is attracting many visitors this year including a host of tourists from Canada and abroad.

Many of the works displayed are those of Hamilton artists and sculptors, and the gallery has acquired a fine general collection, recent acquisitions including paintings by Maurice Cullen, J. W. Morrice, A. Y. Jackson, Lawrence Harris, R. W. Pilor and Charles Comfort, well-known names in Canadian painting.

The gallery committee has undertaken a major project in the loan service through which pictures may be rented, and some pictures may be sold.

As far as new purchases are concerned, the gallery itself has no fund available, and works are obtained through the generosity of patrons and gifts from various sources.

The gallery is mainly financed by membership fees and a grant from the city of Hamilton. There is no admission fee.

**A FISH STORY**

The picture of the fish was a secret sign for Christ in the early days when Christians in Rome used to meet secretly in the catacombs and caves. The picture of the fish was a sign which only the Christians would understand. It was used because the letters of the Greek word for "fish", the word ICHTHUS, first letter of the words in the title, "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior."

## Advise Water Safety Measures

SHEIDIAC, N.B. (CP)—A corner's jury, investigating the drowning of a Halifax airman, Wednesday recommended changes in safety measures along a three-mile stretch of beach on the Northumberland Strait.

The jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning in the death of Cpl. W.P. Rowe, stationed with the RCAF at Moncton. He drowned Monday in the Pointe du Chene area.

Testimony disclosed that four life guards cover the three-mile beach, used on weekends by an estimated 12,000 to 15,000 persons. The jury recommended an increase in the number of guards, new life-saving equipment and the purchase of walkie-talkies.

## N. S. Mining Towns Worry

HALIFAX (CP)—Two Nova Scotia mining towns, reeling towards economic chaos due to shutdowns of major coal mines, planned Thursday to hold citizens' meetings to discuss the future.

Mayor Ralph Gilroy of Springhill announced a citizens' meeting for Aug. 22. Westville's Mayor Alfred Matheson set Aug. 21 as the tentative date for a similar assembly in the Pictou County town.

Springhill's economy was severely crippled by the explosion last November at No. 4 mine, which claimed 39 lives and left 500 men without work. The management announced this week the pit will be permanently sealed.
