S'side Child In Hospital With Injuries

Annual Meeting Of East Prince Conservatives

Mr. P.L. Morris of Kinkora was re-elected president of the East Prince Progressive - Conservative Association following the annual meeting of that body held last evening at the Imperial Diner, Summerside. The meeting was well attended and was addressed by Mr. R.R. Bell, M.L.A., provincial leader of the opposition and Brigadier John Price, former federal candidate for the county as well as other speakers.

Mr. Morris presided and gave a report of the activities of the past year. He said that district organizations have been set up and young Progressive - Conservative Associations organized as well as Women's Associations. He stressed the need of organization and said that as a result of the organization existing in Prince County during the Queen's by-election last spring it was possible to send voluntary workers to that district and thereby assist in gaining a Conservative victory.

A resolution was passed expressing sincere anxiety at the illness of His Majesty The King and calling for continued prayers for a speedy recovery. Resolutions were also passed expressing confidence in the federal leadership of Mr. Drew and the provincial leadership of Mr. Bell. The meeting went on to record as having been appreciation for the interest shown by Brigadier Price, the candidate in the last election. A resolution of sympathy was passed on the death of the late Heath Strong.

Brigadier Price

Brigadier Price congratulated Mr. Morris on the splendid job he has done as president and expressed regret at the passing of Mr. Heath Strong. He also discussed the high cost of living and said that in a time of emergency controls should be imposed. He discussed the national defence program of the government and said that the manpower program has been neglected and if any unit went into serious action it could not be reinforced. Speaking with reference to local matters he said that with little notice Prince County had done a good job in the provincial election, electing two members. He said it was terribly important to keep political organizations strong. He thought it would be a good idea for the party to have a central office and felt the membership fee was a good idea because if people contribute to a movement they feel that they are a part of it. He said: "It seems to be sort of taken for granted by some of the speakers that I will be your candidate. I would like to be your candidate very much. I don't know if I can be or not next time but time will tell."

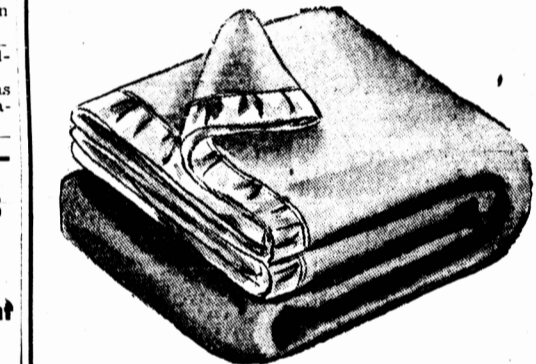
The Rev. Ross Eaton, secretary of the Maritime Temperance Federation was the guest speaker and
