Canadian Nurses Plan Their 50th Convention

By plane, train and bus some 2,000 nurses from across Canada and abroad will gather at the 50th Anniversary Convention of the Canadian Nurses' Association in Ottawa, June 22 to 27. The Convention theme is: "Into the Future—Open a Better Way". The Right Honourable John G. Diefenbaker, Prime Minister of Canada will officially open the Convention on Monday, June 23. The keynote address will be delivered by Miss Daisy Bridges, general secretary, International Council of Nurses, London, England. President of the C.N.A., Trena G. Hunter of Vancouver will preside.

A highlight of the convention will be a theatrical presentation entitled "Cavalcade in White—A Story of Nursing in Canada" starring Joyce Sullivan. This will take place at the Coliseum, Lansdowne Park, Ottawa on June 23 and 24 and will outline the history of Canadian nursing and how the C.N.A. has helped in the development of the nursing profession for the benefit of the public.

Dr. W. Stuart Stanbury, national commissioner, will deliver the Mary Agnes Snively memorial lecture which commemorates the memory of the founder of the Canadian Nurses' Association. Following this address, the Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario, the hostess province, will hold a reception.

On June 24 a prominent Canadian nurse, Miss Lyle Creelman, chief, nursing section, World Health Organization, Geneva, Switzerland, and Miss Agnes Orlson, president, International Council of Nurses, Hartford, Connecticut will speak on "Nursing in the World Today and in the Future".

Two major health problems will be the topic of panel discussion. Mr. Gordon Hawkins, Associate Director, Canadian Association for Adult Education, Toronto, will chair the panel on accident prevention "An Ounce of Magic".
