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IN MEMORIAM

MRS. HUBERT REEVES

On July 13, 1951, Mrs. Hubert Reeves of South Freetown, P.E.I., passed peacefully to her eternal rest. The deceased was in her 80th year and although she had been ailing for some little time the end came suddenly and unexpectedly.

Mrs. Reeves came to Freetown over fifty-five years ago as the bride of the late Hubert C. Reeves and continued to reside on the same property until the day of her death.

Her maiden name was Margaret Ann Buchanan. She was the daughter of Alexander Buchanan and Flora MacDonald of Breadalbane. Her husband predeceased her by thirteen years. Two daughters, Sadie and Katie also predeceased her.

Mrs. Reeves was a life-long member of the Women's Missionary Society and a loyal member of the United Church of Canada. The funeral service, which was largely attended, was held from the home and was conducted by Rev. pastor, Rev. Kenneth Campbell of the Freetown-N. Bedeque charge of the United Church of Canada. He brought a message of comfort and optimism to the bereaved, basing his remarks on Psalm 4:8, "I will both lay me down in peace and sleep, for thou only makest me to dwell in safety." The following hymns, favorites of the deceased, were sung: "The Lord's My Shepherd", "O God of Bethel", "Forever With the Lord".

A solo entitled "When I Go Home" was beautifully rendered by Mr. J. B. Lewis.

In the passing of Mrs. Reeves the community has lost one of its oldest and most esteemed residents, the church has lost an active worker, and a host of people have lost a friend. She has entered upon her well-earned rest and her good works remain to testify to her worth to the community. The funeral arrangements were under the direction of Mr. J. L. Davison, mortician.

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EX-REED M.P. RELEASED FROM PRISON

Fred Rose, Reunited With Wife, Daughter Laura Central figure in Canada's sensational spy probe of 1946, Polish-born Fred Rose has been released from St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary, near Montreal, to which he was sent in 1946 for conspiring to give war secrets to Russia. Since recent amendment to Canada's Citizenship Act, allowing for deportation for accused spies is not retroactive, Rose, once Canada's first Communist M.P., is free to resume his life as Canadian citizen and could even run for Parliament.

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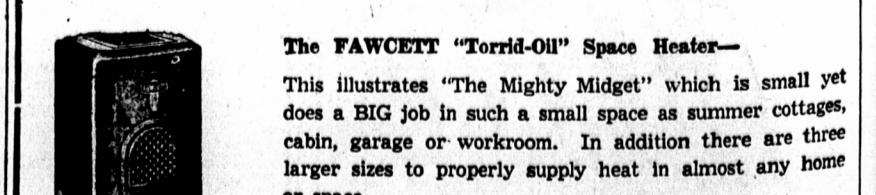
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
