One of the fascinating things about bridge is the ever-changing problems that manage to arise in each deal. We doubt the game would be as interesting as it is if all one had to do was memorize a set of rules and apply the pertinent rule to the particular set of circumstances. The limitless combinations of hands that can be dealt defy categorization. All general principles that have been enunciated have their exceptions, and even the exceptions have their exceptions. Improvisation is the order of the day whenever a player sits down

at the bridge table. Take this case. South is in three notrump and gets a heart lead. He wins the jack with the king and now is supposed to find the line of play that offers the best chance to make the contract. If he slips just one little bit he is a dead pigeon. For example, if he leads the ace of diamonds and then a low one to the king, he will discover there is no longer any way to make the contract. What declarer should do after winning the heart lead and counting his eight top tricks, is to try to develop a ninth trick without allowing East to take the lead for the murderous heart return. He should lead a low diamond to the king and another diamond back. If East produces a small diamond declarer should play the nine, not with the expectation of winning the trick, but to guarantee the contract whether the nine holds the trick or not. Or if East, on the diamond lead from dummy, plays the ten, South should win it, again being certain of at least nine tricks. In other words, it should not be assumed by South that the diamonds will break 3-2. Why should he run the risk of losing the contract by playing for the diamonds to break favorably when, by the expedient of a simple safety play—the nine of diamonds—he can assure the contract beyond question?

Odd Twist Of History Has Germany As Peacemaker

History takes some funny twists. Now it's peaceful Germany in deadlocked negotiations on the European free trade area. The results may determine whether the new Europe is to emerge as a bustling supermarket of some 250,000,000 customers, capable of taking on all comers in an age of big trading battalions or subside into national museums of charming idiosyncrasy, as fossilized as Spain and Portugal.

Host Premier Harold Macmillan seeks Adenauer's support in the latest phase of the post-war battle for a new Europe. Briefly, Macmillan wants Adenauer to put pressure on recalcitrant France in deadlocked negotiations on the European free trade area. The results may determine whether the new Europe is to emerge as a bustling supermarket of some 250,000,000 customers, capable of taking on all comers in an age of big trading battalions or subside into national museums of charming idiosyncrasy, as fossilized as Spain and Portugal.

Time is short. The next move is due at a Pairs meeting May 2.

and British negotiators hint at a July deadline for agreement. Failure would split Europe in two. Britain's political as well as economic attitudes toward Europe would have to be reconsidered, and the Commonwealth would be affected.

SCARE CAMPAIGN?
"It is not going too far to suggest that a conference of Commonwealth prime minister might have to be held, without waiting for the Autumn trade conference in Canada," a British source told this reporter.

These warnings have been dismissed in Paris as part of a scare campaign but Whitehall is taking the situation seriously. Macmillan, an avowed European, has staked much on Britain's new orientation toward the continent. Germany almost certainly will try gentle persuasion on France. A reconciliation between the two inveterate rivals has been a main Adenauer aim. A German economic official, asked how long Germany could wait on a fractious France, replied:

"We have learned to be patient because of our mistakes in the past."

SUCCESS STORY
Adenauer's visit coincides with a European anniversary. Ten years ago—April 16, 1948—saw the signing of accords which led to the Organization for European Economic Co-operation, a 17-nation success story which has lifted industrial production 80 per cent above pre-war levels.

OEEC may be an early casualty if the free trade plan fails. And Europe will remain a narrow strand on the Eurasian land mass with a great past and a doubtful future.

CHURCH DESTROYED

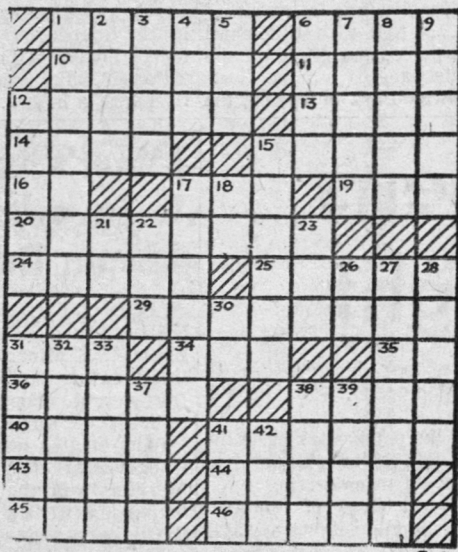
