**CHILD SCALDED—**The three-year-old son of Captain Jennings, of the Salvation Army, was badly scalded a few days ago by falling into a tub of hot water. The child was rescued from its perilous condition as soon as the accident happened, and consequently escaped fatal injuries.

**JUBILEE TEA—**"The wind at morn that dries the dew lawn breathes, and is gone." Thus spoke Gerald Griffin: But we can assure you it will take more than a passing breeze to erase from your minds the beauty of the delicacy you will behold on your arrival at the Jubilee Tea, Morell, on July 4th.

**HUNTER AND CROSSLEY—**The evangelists, Hunter and Crossley, commenced service in Port Arthur, Ont., on the 11th. The churches have proved wholly inadequate to accommodate the vast crowds. The drill shed has been fitted up, but even there many are unable to gain admission to the Sunday evening services.

**VALUABLE SHEEP—**Mr. Godfrey Watters of River Hebert, has a record-breaking flock of sheep, not for speed but for quantity of wool that was on them. He sheared them the first of June, and took sixteen pounds off the largest, and ten pounds off the smallest of his flock.—Amherst Press.

**REBELLION CLAIMS—**A return of claims and losses arising out of the Northwest rebellion in 1885 was presented to Parliament. In the district of Prince Albert the claims were \$748,680, and the awards \$116,216. In the Battleford district the claims were \$311,044, awards \$102,593; Calgary district claims \$61,838, awards \$16,517; Qu'Appelle, \$87,149, awards \$18,372, total claims, \$1,298,713; awards \$483,700.

**MON LAW—**According to the statistician of the Chicago Tribune there were lynched in the United States last year 125 persons, of whom 100 were negroes, 23 whites and two Indians. Mob vengeance was exercised in 24 cases of indecent attacks of more or less atrocity on women; 74 of the lynched were murderers, and the remaining 30 were suspected of various crimes. In two cases it is known that innocent blood was shed by the lynchers.

**Yellow Fever at Santiago.**

SANTIAGO, June 24.—Thus far four soldiers have died from yellow fever, and there are 18 cases in the hospital. One civilian has died from the disease, and there are several civilians suspects. Four companies of the 5th Infantry are the only troops here at present. All have been disinfected on the new fumigating ship.

**A Remarkable Case.**

COLOMBUS, Ind., June 24.—George Wray, aged 103, has been granted a divorce by Judge Hord from Susan E. Wray, aged 30. Wray had been married four times, outliving his other three wives. He said that his last wife came to him and offered to take care of him if he would marry her.

**Unpopular Grand Duke.**

ST. PETERSBURG, June 24.—Grand Duke Valadmir, who was recently sent to the Finland to inspect the troops there, was received unfavorably, even with hostility. Popular irritation in Finland over the Government's scheme to Russinize the province is daily becoming more pronounced.

**Situation in Newfoundland.**

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 24.—The Colonial Ministry maintains that the French warship and fishermen in trying to assert utterly unjustifiable claims on the French shore this season seriously complicate the settlement of the whole question. Reports from the French shore indicate a settled design and a widespread action to carry this object into effect, with results most disastrous to settlers in that region. Conferences between Commodore Gifford, commanding the British squadron in Newfoundland waters, and the members of the Cabinet continue daily.


