### Plan Construction Along Cabot Trail

Ottawa, April 20 — (CP) — The Federal Government has called for tenders for \$1,169,370 worth of construction along the Cabot Trail in Cape Breton Island and for low-rental tourist accommodation at Cape Breton National Park. Resources Department officials have announced.

The road construction will consist of completion of a grade 12 miles long which was started last year; an eight-mile extension of the trail at its eastern end; a crushed gravel base over the entire 20 miles of road and eight miles of heavy grading in the Pleasant Bay sector.

Two new bridges will be built at Ciyburn, in the eastern section, and at Grand Anse, near Pleasant Bay. A third bridge, at Shteticamp, will be completed.

About \$72,000 of the appropriation will be used to build a warren's cabin, a patrol cabin, and approximately 10 low-rental one-room tourist cabins in the park.

#### 20 YEARS WITHOUT ACCIDENT

Montreal, April 18 — (CP) — Colonial Airlines announced today that it had completed 20 years service between Montreal and New York without a fatal accident. The company reported that in setting the safety record, unique among world airlines, more than 310,276,000 passenger miles had been logged and more than 1,204,000 passengers were transported between Montreal, New York, Washington, Ottawa and Bermuda.

### IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JAMES TRAINOR

There passed peacefully away on November 11th, last, at the Sacred Heart Home, Charlottetown, the soul of a great woman, Mrs. James Trainor formerly of Southport, Lot 48, P. E. I.

Mrs. Trainor was born at Grand River, Lot 14, of Highland Scotch parents, eighty-six years ago. Her father was Neil McKinnon and her mother was Elizabeth MacIntyre. To that union thirteen children were born of whom only one survives, namely Rev. J. C. McKinnon (retired) Halifax, N. S.

Although in failing health for a year and a half previous to her death Mrs. Trainor was never heard complaining. Instead she retained her jovial spirit and good humor to the last. Every word she uttered seemed to be a prayer. A kind and motherly greeting was always on her lips, and she breathed forth her magnificent soul into the hands of her Maker fully resigned to His Divine Will.

Her girlhood days were spent in the atmosphere of a truly christian home. Just as she learned to weave the threads of shining wool into cloth so did she weave into the fabric of her life the immortal truths taught by her holy religion. Greatness filled her life. Even the smallest detail was of great importance to her. The pathway of her life was made smooth and straight by her love for God and resignation to His will in all things. Charity to all at all times was exemplified by her life.

Her love for prayer, especially the Rosary, which was almost always at her side and to which she clung even in her dying moments, was an example of the efficacy and comfort of prayer to those who seek its comfort.

Early in life she married James Trainor also of Grand River, Lot 14, who predeceased her almost twenty years ago. To that union were born six children, two of which died in infancy. Four survive namely Rev. Joseph N., Parish Priest, St. Mark's, Lot 7; Mary A., R. N. (Mrs. George Hunter), Wintthrop, Mass.; Charles J., Charlottetown and Edward L., Boston, Mass.

Her funeral was held at St. Dunstan's Basilica, Charlottetown, where a Solemn High Mass of Requiem was sung by her son, Father Trainor, assisted by Rev. Dr. P. McMahon, Rector St. Dunstan's Basilica, as Deacon and Rev. J. V. McCordle, Diocesan Chancellor, as Sub-Deacon.
