

Ch'town Traveller Passes Suddenly

The death occurred suddenly at Souris on Thursday, March 26, of Wilfred A. Doucette, well known Charlottetown commercial traveller, at the age of 71 years.

One of the most genial and best liked of all island travellers, Mr. Doucette was at work as usual in Souris when he took time out for the noon meal. It was after he had lunched in a Souris restaurant that he suddenly took a heart attack and passed away.

Born in Rustico he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Doucette.

An ardent angler, Mr. Doucette's fondest delight was to try his luck on the streams and rivers and many fishermen will recall his skill with the fly rod.

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, the Holy Name Society and St. Dunstan's Basella Men's Association.

His wife predeceased him about two years ago. Left to mourn his passing are two sons, Wilfred in Boston and Gerald in Charlottetown, and two daughters, Gladys in Charlottetown and Rita, Mrs. Emmett Roche, Toronto.

Also surviving are three brothers, Leo, Eugene and Frank of Charlottetown and two sisters, Helen, Mrs. J. A. Peters of Cape Traverse and Agnes, Sister St. Eric of Verdun, Quebec.

The funeral will be held on Monday morning at 9 o'clock from St. Dunstan's Basilica. Interment will be in the Catholic cemetery.

Lobster Cannery Foremen To Attend Special Course

W. A. Murphy, officer-in-charge of the fish inspection laboratory at Charlottetown, will assist in the lectures as will also his assistants, R. L. Doyle and E. L. Boyd. Other lecturers will include Technical Officers Ross MacNeil and Dave Horne, Halifax and H. A. Laventure and K. B. Swansburg of the fish inspection laboratory, Shediac.

A highlight of the three-day program will be a banquet to be given in the Queen Hotel on Thursday evening. Special speaker will be Loran E. Baker, M.C., area director, Department of Fisheries, Halifax.

The Hon. Angus MacLean, Minister of Fisheries, has announced that the Department of Public Works has awarded a contract for \$26,646.21 to Stanley Reid, of Port Hillford, N.S., for the construction of a wharf at Tracadie Harbour, P.E.I. The company submitted the lowest bid on the project in response to the Department's advertising for public tenders. Specified completion date is November 12, 1959.

The new wharf is to measure 160 feet long by 20 feet wide, and will be connected to the public road by an earth fill approach approximately 600 feet long and 24 feet wide. There will be a parking area measuring 50 feet by 100 feet adjacent to the wharf.

The wharf will consist of braced crested pile bents with better piles, wales, fenders, sheathing, caps, and a timber-concrete composite deck. The earth fill approach will be gravelled with rip rap slopes.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Charlottetown District Office of the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch, Department of Public Works.

traffic demands using known figures as a basis for their calculations. In the case of the Chignecto Canal, no such projection was possible, the Queens M.P. said.

Though he realized that there was strong pressure for the canal project emanating particularly from the Saint John district, yet he had never heard the causeway project talked down by any of the Maritimers in the Commons, Mr. Macquarrie said.

To the people of Moncton in particular, its construction was of great interest since its existence would make that centre even more important than it now is, he added.

NEED KNOW
Commenting on an Ottawa Ottawa despatch received by this newspaper which quoted a spokesman for the Transport Department as saying that no decision on an extra boat for the present ferry service could be made until the survey was completed, Mr. Macquarrie said that Transport officials were fully aware of the need for augmentation of the present service, particularly during the peak travel periods, and the possibility of acquiring one of the Michigan boats had been brought to their attention by Hon. Mr. MacLean and his colleagues as far back as last October.

The people of the Province must realize, that in the event that the causeway project is found not feasible or even only remotely feasible, it will then be necessary to press for "as good a boat as science can develop."

However, should the causeway plan get the green light, some temporary addition to the service should then be sought, in view of the possibility that the job may take eight to ten years to complete, Mr. Macquarrie said.

SERIOUS UNDERTAKING
The fact that the federal government had already spent one half million dollars on the project, and that the four island representatives spent a great deal of their time working on one phase or another of the question, shows how seriously Ottawa takes the causeway, the Queens M.P. added.

The extension of the runways at the Charlottetown Airport under construction since last summer, and the roads-to-resources program scheduled to commence this year were added evidence of Ottawa's interest in Prince Edward Island's transportation needs, Mr. Macquarrie remarked.

"Both Works Minister Howard Green and Transport Minister George Hees have said that the Northumberland Causeway will be built 'if feasible, I'm sure their promises will be kept' the Queens M.P. said.
