Canadian Good Roads Convention

To mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of the foundation of the Canadian Good Roads Association, the man who was the president when it met for the first time at the old Montreal Arena, in 1914, will be guest of honour at the coming convention in the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec City, on September 12, 13 and 14. And two of those who were among the speakers at the first convention in America—will be among the speakers at the next meeting.

U. H. Dandurand, a pioneer promoter of an enthusiastic good road movement, was the first president of the Association, and directed the initial meeting. At that time, just a few months before the Great War, only the more important centres in Eastern Canada and the United States were linked with paved highways and these were barely the transformation of the old rutted earth roads, unimproved, poorly drained and always narrow. It required the greatest vision and foresight in those days to imagine the wide, straight, levelled roads of today with their cloverleaf grade separation and divided traffic lanes. It is mostly due to this small group of pioneers that such rapid progress has been made in the past quarter century. But for their early agitation for highway improvement Canada might not be in the leading position she occupies today among the world's travel-conscious nations.

With this thought in mind, the Association purposes paying fitting tribute to its first president, on the 25th Anniversary. Dandurand has lost nothing of his early interest in good roads, and has accepted the invitation to be present at the Quebec meeting.
Two other pioneers of former days who have accepted invitations to be present, are W. G. Robertson, general manager of the Ontario Motor League and W. H. Connelley, Director of the Ontario Federation of Philadelphians, Tri-State District, both international authorities on road building and automobile traffic. Twenty-five years ago, the world's travel-conscious nations, were just beginning to acquire a widespread reputation and were speakers at the first convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association. Now, a quarter century later, they will again speak to the delegates.

GENERAL PROGRAMME
At the opening session on Tuesday morning, September 12, after the addresses of welcome by Hon. E. L. Patenaude, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec; Hon. Maurice Duplessis, Premier, and Hon. Anatole Carignan, Minister of Roads, and short speeches by the Minister of Roads of each of the nine provinces of Canada, the main lectures will be: "Planning a System of Provincial Highways," by Mr. R. M. Smith, Deputy Minister of Roads in Ontario, and "Traffic Regulation and the Co-ordination of City and Provincial Highway Systems," by Mr. Tracy D. Le May, O.L.S., Commissioner of City Planning and City Traffic Engineer for Toronto.

On Wednesday afternoon the delegates will be guests of the Hon. Anatole Carignan, Quebec Minister of Highways, in a motor tour around the Isle of Orleans. In the evening, entertainment will consist of French-Canadian folk-songs and dances.
Addresses on the third day of the convention will be: "Soil Stabilization and Frost Heave Prevention," by Colonel W. P. Wigart, Professor of Civil Engineering at Queen's University; "Grade Separation at Highway Intersections," by Harold J. Giffin, Survey and Plans Engineer for the Highway Department of the State of New Jersey; "Roadside Embellishment," by H. J. Moore, Forestry Superintendent in the Ontario Department of Highways; "Effective Methods for the Enforcement of the Traffic Laws," by Major E. C. Grouard, Director of Provincial Highway Control; by J. A. Racicot, District Engineer in the Quebec Roads Department.

The annual dinner of the Canadian Good Roads Association, in the Ball Room of the Chateau Frontenac, will close the convention on Thursday evening.
Besides the twelve addresses already mentioned, other lectures on the program include: "The Alaska Highway," by Hon. Frank M. MacPherson, Minister of Highways for British Columbia; and papers by Hon. Anatole Carignan, Quebec Minister of Highways; Thomas H. MacDonald, Chief of the Bureau of Good Roads for the United States Government in Washington; and Captain Arthur W. Brandt, Superintendent of Public Works in the State of New York.

Each of the five sessions of the Convention will be presided over by a Minister of Roads of a different province. Deputy Ministers and Chief Engineers from each of the nine provinces will lead the discussions after addresses and highway authorities from both the United States and Canada will take part in discussions.
